## MUST WAIT SCHOOL ACCOMMODATION

Pupils of Grade 1, Rothesay, to Stay Out for Two or Three Weeks More.

A decision to have the pupils of Grade 1 in the Rothesay consolidated school remain away from school until proper accommodation was provided was arrived at last evening at a meeting of the board of school trustees for that district. The meeting was the first since the annual meeting and H. W. Schofield, a new trustee took his place. The attendance on the second day of school was larger than the first and it was reported that there were more to come, so that it will require another teacher and an additional classroom. By dividing up a portion of the main assembly hall a classroom may be prepared but it was found impossible to obtain the necessary school furniture for two or three weeks. It was decided, therefore that the children attending Grade 1, to the number of about thirty-eight, should not continue their attendance until arrangements were made for their accommodation. If the number of families taking up their permanent residence in Rothesay and vicinity continues to increase further school accommodation will undoubtedly be necessary. At present there is no playground accommodation. In the winter-time the school board has through the domestic science teacher has been providing hot drinks for the children at the school house. This was only intended to be for children coming from a distance.

## A FEATURE AT EXHIBITION

A flagpole of unusual design has been set up on the exhibition grounds. It is modelled after the foremost of a warship with yards, rigging and fighting top. It is of white birch and is set in a concrete foundation in the centre of the race course. It stands eighty feet above ground and from the fighting top an excellent view of the surrounding country can be obtained. The rigging is strong with colored electric lights which will add much to the beauty of the grounds at night and a powerful searchlight has been placed in the fighting top. It was the original intention to have the yards manned by the sailors from the Canadian navy, but as the ships are not coming at exhibition time the plan had to be abandoned. The pole was designed by Captain A. J. Wulshy. Although the complete programme for the opening of the exhibition has not yet been decided on it was announced this morning by H. A. Porter, manager, that the lieutenant-governor would officially open the fair. The opening ceremony will begin at 3:30 on Saturday afternoon.

## POLICE COURT


In the police court today two witnesses were examined in the preliminary trial of William Dixon, Nick Shiban, Jack Kesluck and William Trufon, charged with stealing a fire, tin and inner tube, the property of Frank Donnelly, from the latter's automobile in the Golden Grove road on Saturday night, August 27. L. A. Conlon appeared for the first three named. John Chamberlain, a teamster, told of going to the Golden Grove road on the night in question in company with Daniel McCafferty, who, he said, was driving the automobile. The witness said that they stopped at a house on the road for about three-quarters of an hour and on coming out of the house he saw four men standing near the car. Mr. Chamberlain said that when the lights of the car were turned on he recognized Dixon and Kesluck. Sergeant Detective Power, who was the next witness, said that after Detective Saunders had brought Dixon to the police station on Sunday the latter had told the detectives that he knew where to find the other three prisoners and consented to go with the detectives in their search. He took them to a house at Lone Wharf where Shiban, Kesluck and Trufon were found and placed under arrest. Trufon, the sergeant said, was apprehended later in the day. The case was examined by L. A. Conlon, the sergeant said that Dixon had told him that he (Dixon) had had a flat tire on the Golden Grove road and that a tire had been brought to him, but he had refused to use it. The tire, however, had been placed in the car and brought to the city. The case was postponed until Friday morning at eleven o'clock. A case against Peter McCann and William Williamson, charged by the S. P. C. with cruel treatment of a horse on Sunday, August 21, was continued in the court this morning. S. Merritt Wetmore and D. C. Clinch appeared for the S. P. C. Mrs. Sarah Davidson said that Williamson had taken the horse out of McCann's barn about 10:20 Saturday evening and that on Sunday morning she saw him driving the animal up and down Erin street. The witness said she saw a wound in the horse's stomach and that the wound was there when the beast was being driven in the street. Mrs. Davidson said that she telephoned to D. C. Clinch and told him. Mr. Clinch said he went to the barn in Erin street, where with S. Merritt Wetmore and Williamson, he viewed the horse. The witness said that the horse was evidently in great pain. Mr. Clinch told the court that Williamson had said that he had bought the horse from McCann, but had sold it back to him. The witness said that the wound looked as though it had been inflicted by a pitchfork. Mr. Wetmore said that he went to see the horse a second time on Tuesday, August 23. He said the horse was not in the barn, but that he found McCann leading him across the flats to the ferry-boat. The animal was in such pain, the witness said, that he had to be shot. The case was postponed until two o'clock this afternoon.
