Ernest McFarlane, who was arrested last night for drunkenness and beating his mother, was sentenced to four months hard labor this morning by Judge Masson.

The case of Wm. Thomson & Co. v. the Interprovincial Navigation Co. of Canada, Ltd., was before His Honor Mr. Justice McLeod in Supreme Court Chambers this morning. J. B. M. Bacter, K. C., appeared for the plaintiffs and H. A. Powell, K. C., for the defendants. After some discussion by counsel the case was finally settled without proceeding to trial.

The death occurred yesterday morning at Westfield, at 7 o'clock, of Mrs. Catherine Gregg. Deceased was eighty-nine years old and is survived by two sons and two daughters, John, of Westfield, David, of St. John West, Mrs. S. W. Jones, of Boston, and Mrs. Thos. Crawford, of Westfield. The funeral will take place tomorrow morning on the arrival of the Boston train at Fairville, and interment will be in Cedar Hill cemetery. The service will be conducted by Rev. L. N. Parker.

A quiet but pretty wedding took place at 10.30 this morning, at the residence of Mr. Frank Allaby, 154 Waterloo street, when Mr. Lenworth H. Allaby and Miss George Etta Hoeford, both of St. Martins, were united in marriage. Rev. G. Swin, pastor of Waterloo Street Baptist Church, performed the ceremony. Mr. and Mrs. Allaby left on the noon train for their future home in St. Martins.

SYRIAN STUDENT LEADS CLASS AT BALTIMORE

Dr. Sawaya, formerly of St. John, has had a brilliant course in dentistry.

Dr. Farris S. Sawaya, from Mt. Lebanon, Syria, and for some time a resident of St. John, has graduated in dentistry from the University of Maryland, Baltimore. He was honor man of the graduating class in the dental department of the university and was awarded the university medal for his excellent work both theoretically and practically. He also won the first gold medal for cohesive gold fillings and two first honorable mentions.

Dr. Sawaya has had his class in all the studies every year. Last year he also won two gold medals, one for crown and bridge work, and the other for metal and plate work.

During his last year at the university Dr. Sawaya has secured a patent on a machine he invented pertaining to crown and bridge work in dentistry. This patent will be put on the market early in the fall.

Dr. Sawaya has been in the United States and Canada almost six years. He has found many difficulties in studying the English language but has fully mastered the language and graduated with high honors. He is coming to this city in June to practice with Edson M. Wilson, D. D. S.

NEW STREET SPRINKLING SYSTEM TESTED

Streets Watered by Fire Hose Attached to Hydrants—Worked Satisfactorily.

A new system of street sprinkling was tried this morning with excellent results on Mill and Pond streets. A length of fire hose with a sprinkler nozzle attached to a hydrant and by use of it the whole street was thoroughly damped. As it seemed to work satisfactorily it is planned to make this a regular feature of the street department. The new system will be used on the streets which have the heaviest traffic. The sprinkling will be done early in the morning and is expected to keep the dust down until at least twelve or one o'clock. It is not intended to do away with the watering carts but to supplement them.

CONTRACTORS WISH TO ESCAPE RESPONSIBILITY

Special Meeting of the Council Called for Friday Afternoon.

A special meeting of the common council will be held on Friday afternoon at three p. m. The chief business before the council will be the request made by Clarke & Patterson to whom the contract of rebuilding the Marsh bridge abutment was awarded. Under the terms of the contract the contractors are held liable for all damages arising while they are at work. They take the stand that as the city is relieved of liability they ought to escape also.

It is expected that the council will hold them to the terms of their contract and if they do not wish to go ahead with the work their deposit will be forfeited and new tenders will be called for.

The matter of the lease of the Francis Kerr Coal Co. will also come up at this meeting.

KERRIGAN WAS RELEASED TODAY

Promised That He Would Go On the Water Wagon

Cunningham, the Principal Witness in the Case, Had Disappeared—Civil Business Comes Next

The criminal session of the County Court, held this morning when His Honor Judge Forbes allowed Dominick Kerrigan his liberty on his own recognizance to appear for trial when the court sits for him. The principal crown witness, Joseph Cunningham, skipped out of town some time ago and the police have been unable to ascertain his whereabouts. Consequently Cunningham is indebted to His Majesty the King in the sum of two hundred dollars. On the motion of Attorney General Hazen the recognizance of Cunningham was excheated to the crown.

Kerrigan was arrested on April 7th last on the charge of stealing a check and a sum of money from Cunningham. Magistrate Ritchie sent him up for trial on April 26th and he has been confined in goal since his arrest. Kerrigan promised His Honor that he would wear a white ribbon for a long time to come, so he left court with an expired ticket for Chipman, \$1.50 cash, and his liberty.

The petit jury were then discharged and the court adjourned until tomorrow morning at ten o'clock when the following civil cases will be taken up in rotation:
