Cabinet Names Oct. 25 As Thanksgiving Day

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 31.-An order in council was passed this afternoon

in council was passed this afternoon appointing Monday, October 25th, as Thanksgiving Day. The government decided to continue the innovation set last year of making Thanksgiving Day come on a Monday instead of on Thursday as heretofore.

In accordance with the act of parliament passed last session the government has appointed a strong und representative commission for the concretation of the natural resources of Canada. The personnel of the commission was made known after today's meeting of the cabinet council. Hon. Clifford Sifton is chairman and will as such be its administrative head and have control of the carrying out of the commission's recommendations and of the work of the officers and staff, it is under the act, empowered to appoint.

Asquith Tells Deputation That Existence of Disease in United States is the Cause.

LONDON, Aug. 31—A deputation representing various trading interests attended parliament today to ask the government to remove the embargo on the importation of Canadian cattle. Premier Asquicth said he regretted that he saw no possibility of acceding to this request, for while it might be true that disease was non-existent among cattle in Canada it was indisputable that disease appeared from time to time in the United States with disastrous results and it was impossible for this purpose to put Canada and the United State into water-tight compartments owing to the long and loosely guarded boundary line.

COMPLETE PLAN TO PREVENTWAR

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 31.— Lord Charles Beresford formally opened the Toronto fair today. In reply to the address presented to him, Admiral Beresford said in part: "There must be a carefully compiled, concise and practical plan for defeating the enemy's ficets if war should unfortunately be forced upon us. A complete scheme should prevent war and ensure peace.

"The question of the safety of the Empire should be put beyond any possible doubt whatever.

"Our supremacy at rea has been threatened in language that is unmistakeable. In the near future that threat may become a reality. It is our business to see that our present position is not jeopardized in any way.

"If the result of the London conference produces imperial organization fot war in which the whole Empire takes part, it should preserve our supremacy intact. The latent resources of the Empire have not been called upon as yet to join in organization which to be
