FIRST GIRL EXPLORER

Miss Ellison Going on Expedition to Butler's Lake Region, the Wonderland of Vancouver Island.

Victoria, July 13.—To make a thorough study of conditions at Butler's Lake with regard to the prospective development of that picturesque section of Vancouver Island as a great natural park and game preserve.

The minister is accompanied on the expedition by his daughter, Miss Myra K. Ellison, who, although but 17 years of age, is fitted by a life in the field to face the difficulties of such an exploration.

Although scores of prospectors and timber cruisers have ere this looked upon Butler's Lake, not even an Indian woman so far has enjoyed the panorama.

The expedition will make its real start from the wilderness from the mouth of Campbell River, where it awaits the party. With these the leaders of the party will voyage to Butler's Lake by way of the Campbell River and lakes, attacking the numerous portages necessitated by the jagged peaks and other natural obstructions.

The reserve as at present defined is in the general form of a right angled triangle having the line of the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway as its hypotenuse.

Butler's Lake itself is roughly twenty miles in length but does not anywhere exceed a mile in width. From this lake Campbell River debouches, while all about are mountains worthy to rank in beauty with the Selkirk or the Alps.

CHIVALRY IS ONLY HUMBUG

Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont Declares Votes for Women Would Not Destroy Because It Does Not Exist.

London, July 13.—The Women's Suffrage bill debate in the House of Commons is being followed with keen interest by Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont, mother of the Duchess of Marlborough.

"Our methods are peaceful," she said, "because there is no need for militant tactics. We are never unable to get permission to approach the legislators. Our idea is to spread the movement by educating the people."

"I have been a believer in women's suffrage all my life. The argument that votes for women would destroy sex chivalry is absurd, because the so-called chivalry of men is all humbug. In America you have only got to watch the way the men push the women aside in street cars to see how weak this 'chivalry' is worth."

Share Husband's Earnings

"One of the things I should like to see legalized for women is the right of the wife to share equally with her husband in community or property."

"We are not living in the first century, but in the twentieth. We have got to face things as they are at the present time. The wife does all the work for the husband and gets half the money for it. She ought to get half of what the man earns. The wife ought to be man's equal, not his servant."

The reason why housework has always been regarded as a degrading occupation is because it has been free labor. In America there are 6,000,000 self-supporting women, and in New York State alone the self-supporting women number 3,100,000.

"In America," added Mrs. Belmont, "we are more fearful of offending conventional codes than are the women in England. The reason is that the suffrage movement here has been backed by women of standing in society whose position is assured. In America we have only just begun to attract the wealthiest classes. We feel in America that the methods adopted in England have been quite justifiable."

"We are following the progress of the Suffrage bill debate with great interest. The result will mean much to the movement, because I cannot regard it as possible that if Englishmen grant the vote to women, Americans will not care to refuse it."

Black Army Boards Alleghany Off North Coast of Hayti-- Busy Bees Improve Each Shining Hour.

New York, July 13.—It is a hard thing these days to beat the steamship companies in the matter of transportation. If one is bigger than a bee and stows away, he is equally compelled to peel potatoes or feed fuel to the furnace in exchange for his ride on the liner.
