

church at Newburgh. A parsonage is in construction at Hartland; it is being built by the whole pastorate." Bro. Daggett is to remain another year—his third.

Rev. W. C. Keirstead reports that he spent the school year at Cobb Divinity School, and believes it was a profitable year. The summer months he spent as a supply for Dr. Hartley, St. John, West. Last week he started for Chicago University. He regrets that he cannot be at Conference.

Rev. A. D. Paul has had a good year as pastor of the Deer Island churches. The Lambert's Cove church was organized, the church building dedicated, and twenty-four members added by baptism; it is "in very good condition spiritually." Fair Haven church "has suffered loss of members by death and removals; two were baptized. "Chocolate Cove church has made some progress. There was a revival; four were baptized, and a number of wanderers helped." The pastor "preaches in each church every Sunday, and attends a week-night prayer meeting in each." He is to remain another year.

Rev. D. Patterson has had charge of a pastorate which includes Carpenter, Shannon, Henderson, Big Cove, Narrows, and Perry's Point, and has had a good year. It has been a "laborious year, but there has been the joy of seeing Zion prosper somewhat." He has "held three services every Sunday, giving each church two Sunday services a month." "For the greater part of the winter and spring special meetings were held. A revival interest of marked power was enjoyed." Churches were strengthened, difficulties were removed, and a forward move was taken by many in Christian service." Forty-seven were baptized, and forty-six added to the churches." The various branches of Christian work, as Sabbath schools, missions, the right support of the church, etc., have been given attention. One church in Bro. Patterson's pastorate, Perry's Point, which had long been dormant, was quickened into life and much increased in membership. And a new preaching station has been established—in the hall at Cody's, a monthly service. Bro. Patterson continues with the pastorate another year.

Rev. A. J. Prosser, pastor of Penobscuis, Newtown and Dutch Valley churches, reports the work "as going forward in the ordinary way." "The religious interest, if it is to be judged by the attendance at the prayer and conference meetings, is not what we desire." Special work was done at Newtown; one was baptized. "Penobscuis has purchased a parsonage, which is a decided advantage to the work."
