Sproule, delegate to N. H. L., C. Querre, manager Frank Heffernan.

Somehow the list bears a remarkable resemblance to the officers of the club which has just disposed of the franchise. Frank Heffernan will play and manage the team. It is known that efforts have been made to induce Miller, the former Kitchener player, to take the jump. Others in demand are Roach, McCarthy and "Babe" Dye. "Ken" Randall and Corbett Denney are in the city and will be tendered contracts.

THE NORTHERN LEAGUE ANNUAL

W. P. Rhodes of London Elected President at the 18th. Annual Meeting

Palmerston, Dec. 9--Despite the diminished railway service in this section of the Province, the eighteenth annual meeting of the Northern Hockey League was well attended here today at the Queen's Hotel by delegates from fifteen teams. The league passed through several lean years but it will probably gain steadily in proportions year by year.

The amendments in most instances were given hearty support. The war measures which provided the soldier hockeyists certain privileges were rescinded and will be removed from the regulations, since their necessity has outlived their usefulness.

The travelling expenses of visiting teams were raised from ten cents per mile to twenty and the same for referees, whose minimum fee will be \$7 and mileage.

The 20-foot outside rule on rebounds from the goalkeeper was adopted. One substitute player can be used whenever required.

Teams were given until December 20 to make their entries with Secretary Bamford. The following teams paid their entrance fees today: Warton (two) Elora (two) Walkerton, Durham (two) Elora (two) Southampton, Harris (two) Mt. Royal (Hanover) Palmerston (two).

Listed, champions of the senior series last season, were congratulated as were also Stratford, winners of the junior series.

The latter team captured the Free Press Trophy permanently last season taking it three years in succession. Another Free Press Trophy will be donated. The new senior trophy has been completed for only during the last two years, Dunnville winning it in 1918.

Heffernan made an auspicious start as the manager of the St. Patrick's hockey team when he succeeded in coaxing "Duke Keats back into professional ranks. Pate yesterday Keats wired from Edmonton that the terms offered were satisfactory, and that he would be up with the Irish team this season.

Barring Mike MacKay there is no better forward in hockey than Keats and St. Patrick's are indeed fortunate to secure his services. "Cully" Wilson who played on the Toronto team which won the Stanley Cup in 1913, has also accepted terms, and it is expected that others will follow suit today.

Yesterday "Babe" Dye the well-known sharpshooter, who was among those barred by the O. H. A. was approved by the R. T. A. B. A. He is proficient in hockey, lacrosse, and baseball, and would undoubtedly make good in the professional ranks. Last season Frank Shaughnessy, manager of the Hamilton Baseball team, made efforts to secure him but failed. Shaughnessy believes that Dye has a bright future ahead of him in baseball.

COMMISSION WILL N ON RUNNING CARS

Sir Adam Beck and Others Address the Audience in Sympathy With Elmira

WHY IT WOULD BE PAI

If the attitude of the citizens who attended the meeting in the City Hall last evening is a criterion the ratepayers will carry the Elмира to Hamilton radial railway bylaw on January 1st. Explanation of the by-law was made for the benefit of the ratepayers and all doubts cleared up by Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Hydro Power Commission, Chief Engineer Gaby, Mr. J. W. Lyons, Guelph, president of the Hydro Electric Radial Railway Association and Mr. Hamilton, treasurer, Guelph. At the close of the meeting Mayor Gross told Sir Adam Beck that after the clearing up of doubtful clauses as they might affect this city he felt certain that the by-law would carry in this city.

Do Not Insist on King Street. Several points as the radial railway will effect this city were brought out. Mayor Gross had asked Sir Adam about the company's intention to use King street to Waterloo.

"We would like some information on that point. There is a feeling that if your cars run up and went over this street there would be too much congestion," the mayor said. "We intend to use our own right of way. Of course since you might want to run through the centre of your city we had to make provision. But the use of King street by us would be dependent upon arrangements we could make. I might say that while this commission is not anxious to have another load placed on its shoulders experience shows that no street railway in a city of less than 50,000 people is paying."

The Mayor again referred to the possible congestion there would be on King street with the radial cars also running on it.

"I do not think that you have a 37 second service on your line. There would not be any congestion," Sir Adam replied. "But as I have said I intend to use our own right of way in the west end of the city. There is nothing in the by-law regarding using King street. And it would only be used in case you wanted us to do so. We could run our local cars over it if you wanted this, and run our through cars over our own right of way. But this would involve a street railway service," Sir Adam replied.

SINN FEIN M. P. UNDER ARREST

DUBLIN, Dec. 11--Thomas Kelly, Sinn Fein member of the Commons, was arrested in the course of a number of raids by the police and military this morning, when the houses of several prominent Sinn Feiners were searched. The residences entered by the authorities included the home of Count Plunkett who was absent at the time.

Several other arrests were made beside that of Kelly. The prisoners were taken to Kingston in military lorries. They were then placed in rowboats and taken to a wharf which waited for an armed party. The approaches to harbor were guarded by military with armored cars and tanks. It is rumored that the destination of prisoners is Wormwood Scrubs Jail, London.

Kelly was served on Tuesday evening with a police magistrate's order to close the Sinn Fein headquarters which despite several raids and its suppression by communication has continued. The order was not obeyed, the headquarters still being open when the raid took place.

SEA TRAGEDY IMMI

Steamers Collide 500 Miles From Halifax--W Not Serious--Carmania Returning to

Halifax, Dec. 11--A tragedy of the sea, a vessel of the Carmania, a British ship, was wrecked on the coast of Cape Race.

Early last evening coast stations picked S. by the Carmania. Later messages supplied the vessels had collided five hundred miles from Halifax.

Details of accident are lacking but from what learned that the Maryland struck the Carmania and that the damage was all above the waterline.

Reports stated that she was not seriously damaged. Halifax, while the Maryland is continuing her voyage, the Carmania carries a number of passengers.
