**SOME STRIKING FACTS FROM SCOTLAND**

It is a happy coincidence that with the coming of the first direct Prohibition member of Parliament to our House of Commons should come from the country that sent him, some very striking facts regarding the beneficial results experienced in those areas in Scotland that under the Scotch Act adopted the principle for which he stands. We give here some striking testimonies.

**Lewis**—The Island of Lewis has practically been made sober by Act of Parliament. The carrying of the No-Licence resolution has been an unmixt blessing to Stornoway and the whole island of Lewis. The queues waiting the opening of our drink-bars, and the noisy, quarrelsome bands of young men who used to parade our streets are no longer to be seen. Cases of drunkenness and disorderly conduct are now very rare, and our prison and police cells are empty. Crime is all but unknown.

 Lerwick—To date (August 23rd, 1922) since the No-Licence came into force only six persons charged before the courts were the worse for drink when the offence was committed. This covers two fishing periods, when a large influx of people were in town; compared with 74 for a similar previous period including two fishing seasons with a much less influx of people. In pre-war days the number was far greater.

Very beneficial results are also noticeable in houses where drunkenness existed, and now, instead of dirt and misery, there are cleanliness and happiness and content.
