INDIA OF YESTERDAY, TO-DAY AND FUTURE

John Raja Isaac of India Spoke at Marysville on India and Her Problems.

Marysville, N. B., Nov. 2.—About three hundred people assembled in the gymnasium of the Dawson Club last evening to listen to a talk on India by John Raja Isaac of India. He is a native of Madras and at the present time is secretary of the Y. M. C. A. at Bangalore, India, and is making a tour of Canada and the United States. Mr. Isaac was on the executive of the National Christian Council and was awarded the title of member of British Empire by King George for service rendered in Mesopotamia during the Great War. He has a very pleasing personality and has an exceptionally fine command of the English language.

Mr. Isaac's subject was India of Yesterday, To-day and the Future, and in dealing with it he graphically described the customs of the people of India and told of the many forms of religion practiced in that country. He was very warm in his praise of Great Britain and said that the people of India were very grateful for what she had done for them. In closing he asked that Canada would send more missionaries to India to help spread the Gospel. At the conclusion of his talk he was given hearty applause and a vote of thanks moved by Rev. J. M. Baxter, B. A., and seconded by the entire audience was presented to Mr. Isaac by A. H. Wilson, chairman of the meeting.

POTATOES BRING \$7 AT PRESQUE ISLE

Fancy Lots Have Even Sold as High as \$8 at Maine Town.

Presque Isle, Me., Nov. 2.—The potato market opened strong to-day and the bulk of the sales was at \$7 cash to growers bulk barrel measure for Green Mountains, the highest market reached in four years. Some lots went even higher and, as usual, small or fancy lots and special grades were made at higher prices, in many places in the county as high as \$8.

Something of a flurry has been caused by persistent rumors that importers of foreign potatoes had been able to lift the embargo on European potatoes removed and that shipments of European potatoes were being made ready to go forward by Nov. 10 from German and other ports.

Numerous telegrams were sent to the Maine congressmen in protest and there has been considerable relief in a reply from Senator Fernald that the United States Department of Agriculture has placed an embargo on potatoes from practically all foreign countries because of wart disease and that potatoes will be admitted only from Canada, Bermuda and two states in Mexico.

Senator Hale replied that there was no foundation for any rumors or the lifting of the embargo.

ARRESTS SUSPECTS.

Baddeck, N. S., Nov. 2.—Angus McKenzie and John McLeod, residents of North River, N. S., both about thirty years of age, were arrested today in connection with the death of Murdoch A. Morrison, of North River, near here, whose lifeless body was found floating in the North River last Friday.

Newcastle, N. B., Nov. 2.—Many friends will regret to learn of the death of Mrs. Lotta Hosford at her home in Trout Brook, N. B., on Friday, Oct. 23rd, after a lingering illness. She was 75 years old, and is survived by her husband, William Hosford. The funeral was held Sunday afternoon. Services were held at the United Church at Trout Brook, N. B. Rev. M. Brodie conducted the services at the house and grave.

To Open Up Street Extension.

In connection with the purchase of two lots for the extension of Windsor street from Gray to Alexandra streets by the city, Ald. Cooper, chairman of the Roads and Streets Committee, moved last evening before the City Council that the city proceed with the opening up of this street in the spring of 1926 in consideration of the deeds to be given the city by Ald. D. W. Olte and P. T. Thomas from whom the lots were purchased. The motion was seconded and carried.

There is a report of good fishing for dusky diamonds off Crow Point, Ellingham, Mass. A large carrying 170 tons of coal drove ashore in a gale and broke apart when the tide fell.

HOSPITAL FINANCES.

City's Grant Insufficient to Meet Cost of Free and Part-Pay Patients From the City.

An interim report, submitted by Col. T. G. Luggie, I. S. O., on behalf of the Finance Committee of the Board of Trustees of the Victoria Public Hospital, to the City Council last evening showed that the city's grant would be overrun this year by expense incurred by the free and part-pay treatment afforded city patients.

It was intimated that the city would be approached in the near future with a proposal that the council enter into an agreement to make good the amount expended in excess of the annual grant.

Similar agreements are in effect with the Towns of Marysville and Devon and it is expected that the Municipalities of York and Sunbury will be similarly approached.

It was pointed out by Mayor Phillips in reply to a question that present rates charged patients are based on actual cost without any provision for capital cost.

GRAND FALLS HYDRO POWER DISCUSSED

The New Brunswick Electric Power Commission Met at St. John.

St. John, N. B., Nov. 3.—The matter of the proposed development of Grand Falls for hydro-electric power was discussed by members of the New Brunswick Government and the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission at the meeting of the commission here yesterday afternoon. Premier J. B. M. Baxter said after the meeting that there was nothing to announce in regard to this question.

A delegation from the Nashuaak Pulp and Paper Company waited on the commission with a request for a supply of electricity to the local plant. Hon. E. A. Reilly, K. C., of Moncton, chairman of the commission, said following the meeting that there had been no action taken on the petition.

SUDDEN DEATH OF CARLETON CO. MAN

Florenceville, N. B., Nov. 2.—John Watters was found dead in his bed at his home in Williamstone Sunday. His death was particularly sad, as he had recently undertaken to work the farm of his son, Eldon Watters, who died in August, leaving a wife and six children, the eldest being about 12 years of age. John Watters was an elderly man and his death is believed to have been due to heart trouble. He is survived by his wife and several children.

FASTER COLLAPSES.

Amiens, France, Nov. 2.—Harry Hock, a professional faster, who entered his glass case Oct. 2, has just concluded 30 days' complete fasting under the supervision of officials. Hock, emerging from the enclosure, asked for a glass of water, then collapsed, and had to be put to bed.

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FLORENCEVILLE MAN INSTANTLY KILLED

John Palmer Fell Under Wheels of Wagon Loaded With Rocks.

Florenceville, N. B., Nov. 2.—John Palmer, former resident of Tracey's Mills, was almost instantly killed at noon to-day when he was seized with a heart attack and fell in front of a team of horses with rocks on a stone drag, and horses and drag went over the body. Mr. Palmer had been a farmer at Tracey's Mills and a short while ago he went to California to reside, but was forced to return to New Brunswick because of his health. His wife remained in California.

Mr. Palmer was driving occasionally with William MacDonald on his farm at Centreville as means of passing time and was helping to remove rock from the fields.

Mr. Palmer, who was about 60 years of age, has a sister, Mrs. Nelson, living near Centreville. The funeral will be held from her home.

EXCITING FIGHT WITH TWO BEARS

Miramichi Hunter Kills Both as Well as a Moose and Fox.

Newcastle, Nov. 2.—Vincent Connell, of Barthelemy, had a thrilling experience in his back of his home on Saturday. Starting out in the morning he set of game he brought along a rifle and six bullets. He shot a big bull moose and a fox, using four of the bullets, and after dressing the spoils started on his way home.

A short distance from the place where he had made the killing Connell came across two fresh bear tracks. He followed and came upon the two of them, a big bruin and a female just as they were going into their den. He fired and wounded the big fellow, who ran into the den turned and, bawling with pain, charged back at Connell but fell dead at the hunter's feet.

The female, also showing signs of fight, advanced towards Connell, who fired his last bullet into her and grabbed his axe. The last shot was all that was necessary and the female fell dead in his arms.

Mr. Connell, an experienced guide and a crack shot.

Want Armistice Observance. The Mayor and Aldermen of the City Council have been requested by resolution adopted by the Governor Carleton Chapter I. O. O. E. to issue a proclamation calling upon the citizens to observe two minutes silence at 11 o'clock on Armistice Day in memory of the nation's soldier dead. This request is being considered in conjunction with the probable action of the Government.

City Council Grants Permission. Permission has been granted by the City Council for the erection of a perpendicular clear sign by the Royal Stores, Ltd., in front of their place of business on York street. The permission has been granted subject to the approval of City Engineer G. C. McDowell, the sign to be erected so as not to be a sidewalk obstruction.

LIQUOR SEIZURE AT MEDUCTIC BRIDGE

Two Young Men and 20 Cases of Whiskey Captured in Overturned Car.

Woodstock, N. B., Nov. 2.—Ex-Mayor J. R. Brown, recently appointed liquor inspector, accompanied by Chief of Police Kelly, Deputy Sheriff Moores and Customs Excise Officer J. S. Leighton, made his initial seizure of contraband liquor this forenoon at Meductic Bridge, 12 miles below Woodstock, when a Red six sedan, loaded with 20 cases of whiskey and manned by two young men, from Moncton and St. Leonards, respectively, overturned on the road.

Stalling the engine when endeavoring to change gears on the hill and finding his breaks would not function, the driver, in an effort to avoid backing, swiftly down to the bridge and the possibility of crashing through the railing and dropping a hundred feet to the stream below, cut sharply across the road, and brought up against the bank. In doing so the car toppled over on its side.

The officers appearing promptly on the scene, Liquor Inspector Brown causing the arrest of the young man and seizing the liquor, while Excise Officer Leighton seized the car, which bore a Nova Scotia license.

The young men appeared before Police Magistrate Comben this afternoon for hearing and were remanded to jail pending trial tomorrow morning, when F. C. Squires will appear in their defence.
