CAMERON, Ludwig Kribbs, Ont. civil service, commenced his newspaper experience as a reporter on his brother's paper, the *London Advertiser*, becoming afterwards city ed. of that journal. Later, he proceeded to Winnipeg where he founded *The Nor'-West Farmer*. A family bereavement compelled his return to London, where he became Mangr. and Presdt. of The *Advertiser* Printing and Publishing Co. He was still fulfilling the duties of this position when he received the appt. of Queen's Printer and Accountant to the Legislature of Ont., May 20, 1890. He is V.-P. of the Interocean Mining and Prospecting Co.—390 *Markham St., Toronto.*

CAMERON, Malcolm Colin, barrister and legislator, is the s. of the late Hon. Malcolm Cameron, formerly a mem. of the Can. Govt., and a well-known Temp. advocate, and was b. at Perth, Ont., Apr. 12, 1832. Ed. at Knox Coll., Toronto, he was called to the bar 1860, and has for many yrs. successfully practised his profession in Goderich. He was for some time a mem. of the Town Council, and afterwards Mayor of Goderich. A Lib., he sat for South Huron in the Ho. of Commons, 1867-82; and for West Huron, 1882-87, when defeated. He unsuccessfully contested the same constituency, Feb., 1892 (*Vote: Hon. J. C. Patterson, Secy. of State, C., 2179; M. C. Cameron, L., 2154*), but was returned at another bye-election, Jan., 1896, and re-elected at the Dom. g. e. 1896. He is the author

of a pamphlet, "A Vile Conspiracy Exposed—Mr. M. C. Cameron vindicated" (Goderich, 1892), which had reference to certain infamous charges brought against him by the *Goderich Star*, and for which charges he brought a criminal action against the *Star*, and secured a conviction, a withdrawal of the charges and an apology. He is a supporter of Provl. rights, and was opposed to the coercion of Man., though willing that any rights or privilege enjoyed by the Caths. of Man., prior to 1890 which have been encroached on, should be restored to them by the Province. CAMERON, Sir Roderick William, merchant and capitalist, is the s. of the late Duncan Cameron, for many yrs. an active partner in the old N.-W. Fur Co., and subsequently M.P. for Glengarry in the U. C. Assembly. B. at Williamstown, Glengarry, Ont., July 25, 1825, he was ed. at the Grammar schs. of Williamstown and Kingston, and commenced his business career as a commission agent and broker in N. Y. In 1852 he established a line of packet ships between N. Y. and Australia, which line continues to the present day. His firm, R. W. Cameron & Co., are large shippers of merchandise, both by their own vessels and by others. They have offices in London, Eng., and in Australia, as well as in N. Y. Sir R. served as a del. from Can. to Washington, 1849 and 1850, in connection with negotiations between those two countries touching the reciprocity treaty afterwards concluded, and he was an hon. Comnr. from Australia to the International Exhna. at Philadelphia, 1876, and at Paris, 1878. He represented Can. at the Exhna. at Sydney and Melbourne, in 1880 and 1881.
