seats. For the past few years Torontonians have had to pay pretty stiff rates for seats at the Grand, for only ordinary attractions. Now, sir, why cannot we have in this city a moder-ate scale of prices' I in nearly every American city first-class theatres are now at popular rates, viz. 25c, 35c, and 50c, and the atrac-tions equalled anything offered in this city last season at 75c and \$1.50. In fact, I was present in a United States theatre and paid 35 cents to a sea combination that I was compelled to give up \$1 to see here. Now \$1 is harder to got here than in the neighboring republic. Can you explain this anomaly! The people who attend the theatres regularly are the middle classes, and they cannot afford to pay over 25c., 35c, and 60c, according to loca-tion, for seats.
