Books On Water Sports
For Summer Fun Reading

Summer and water sports are almost synonymous in this area because of the abundance of pools and our proximity to the lakes. Whether you are contemplating scuba diving, teaching your children to swim, or boating, the following titles in the Township Library will be of interest to you:

Scuba Diver: The Path To Under Water Adventure: by Matkin and Brookes explains the rudiments of scuba diving but more than this, the authors are able to catch the interest of the readers through their love of the sport. Underwater basics such as pre-dive checks, life-jacket devices, and underwater communication are supplemented

with descriptions of underwater life and adventures.

Fell's Official Guide To Diving: by Harry Froboes is a well illustrated guide to the art of diving. The fundamentals of plain diving are described as well as such fancy dives as the armstand. Short chapters on high diving, comedy diving, platform diving and supplemental exercises are included. Springboard diving tables are part of the appendix.

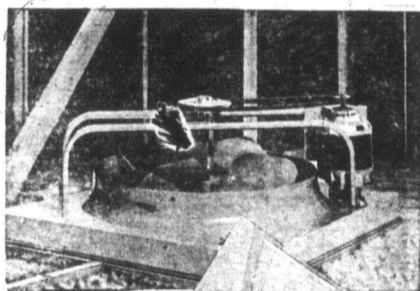
How To Teach Children To Swim: by Carolyn Kauffman. Every summer some parents are determined to teach their children how to swim. Carolyn Kauffman is an expert in teaching three and four year olds how to swim and

it is well to profit from her experiences. The ten lesson plans in this book are invaluable aids if you plan to teach your children how to swim this summer. Special chapters have been added on the problems of pool owners and water games.

Water Games, by H. M. Smith is the ideal companion for picnics, and pool parties. The many games are geared to teaching different degrees of water skill and range from I Spy to the Bookworm Race (where each contestant must roll over on his back and read a newspaper aloud during the race). A special evaluation chart is included in the back.

You Can Build Your Own Sailboat: by Donald Rouse is a practical, easy to follow guide for building a small sailboat. This boat is simple enough to be built by 12 year olds with a minimum of help from adults. The plans and many photographs of the boat in progress simplify the construction.

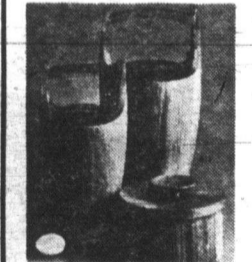
