A proposed farmer's market in Port Credit may not get off the ground because the Credit Valley plans for this year, and Lions Club, sponsors of the project don't want to use "second-rate

That's the opinion of Harry Robinson, first vicepresident of the club. He says that the Lions have been unable to book "the good farmers" for the market space, and he doesn't want to use anything but the best.

"First of all, we haven't got a site that is suitable, Robinson told The Times Monday. "What they threw at us is the GO station (site) — but that's piled high with rubble.'

He said the parking lot at the GO station will not be paved until the end of the year, and the Lions were reluctant to open the market there.

Another possible location, said Robinson, is beside the Showboat at Port Credit harbor, but he like that location

"It's too close to the lake, and some of them (the farmers) don't think it's too healthy an area, Robinson said.

'They would like to go to the main drag in Port Credit-Lakeshore Road. That will come, but it will take time.

In the meantime, he said, the Lions are afraid that if they open the market with a poor loca-tion and quality of product, people will stay away and the idea will not

The problem with getting the 'good farmers,' according to Robinson, is that they book themselves into markets as early as January. There has been an attempt to lure some of the farmers who go to Square One Shopping Centre, but so far it has

been unsuccessful. "It was supposed to be started as soon as possible," Robinson said, "but I talked to the men in the club, and we aren't in
