You won't want to miss this show. The Adamson Estate (go south off Lakeshore Road on Adamson Lane in East Port Credit) is refurbished and open to the public. For \$3.50 admission you will come away with a thousand decorating ideas, but plan your trip immediately - it closes June 18.

It's a feast of design, inside and out, with color used boldly and imaginatively. Rooms dance with inventiveness, as each room takes on the personality of its own designer.

The living room and sunroom (by Blueberries Interiors) explode with color, responding to the garden setting with the lake sparkling beyond the sunroom.

The handsome dining room (by Sally Van Camp and John

Every room tells a story. Barbara Marcus Roland of Shelagh's Limited learned that the Adamson family had collected antiques in the Orient and was inspired to create a guest room rich with the spirit of the Far East.

The master bedroom and bathroom, designed by Carol L. Watts of Wilshire House, used deep-sueded spruce walls and plush apricot carpet, setting off a brass headboard. The wing chairs by the fireplace invite relaxation.

Jessica Steven was design co-ordinator for the house and, as well, contributed a girl's bedroom and the design of the

He selected furnishings from around the world, combining primitive New Guinea sculpture with 18th century antiques, reproductions with Dada anti-art and contemporary pieces. The whole is pulled together with a multitude of plants, resulting in one of the

halls. The halls offered a special challenge. She had to bridge the taste of the designers in the spring-bouquet living room and dramatic blue dining room. Her response was a pale yellow and an Art Nouveau style wallpaper that is a reminder of the 1920 date of the house.

There is a little tearoom in the basement of the house where visitors can rest and enjoy a cup of tea before continuing to explore.

The gardens musn't be missed, either. There is a splendid rose arbor and beautiful beds west of the terrace, joining the lake

And as you stroll back to your car, listen to the birds in the woods, and stop to admire the wild fern and trillium. The house and the setting represent once-upon-a-time, affording us a little private daydream of our own Camelot.
