Retiring to RCAF Officer Reserve  
Wing Commander Arthur J. Vincent, AFC, Chief Flying Instructor at No. 1 SFTS, Camp Borden, since June, 1944, and acting commanding officer for a time, is retiring from active service to the RCAF Permanent Reserve of Officers. With his wife and two sons he has resided at 107 Blake St., Barrie. They have taken up residence in Toronto at 9 Traymore Crescent for a time prior to leaving for Winnipeg.

WC Vincent was honored last Thursday at Little Norway, Muskoka, when he was presented with honorary wings of the Royal Norwegian Air Force "for services rendered." Pilots of the RCAF have been getting their advanced training and wings at Camp Borden for some time. WC Vincent, who was highly regarded by all ranks at Camp Borden and was honorary president of the No. 1 SFTS Sports Club, was further honored at an Officers' Mess dinner Tuesday.

Having completed five years of active service and some 2000 hours of flying with the RCAF, he is returning to school and plans to enter the legal profession.

The powerful A33 CACTE team rode roughshod to an 11-1 win over No. 1 SFTS Flyers in the opening game of the Camp Borden Hockey League at Barrie Arena Monday night. In the second game, A19 CASCTC, last year's champions, tied A22 CAMCTC, at four goals each. It was a rough and tough, but fast and thrilling match, the like of which brings out hockey fans in droves.

Capt. Blair Cook's Rams had too much power even with only 10 men dressed for FO Jerry Reed's Flyers, who had 14 players in uniform. Bobby McLaughlin, former Toronto Marlboro centre, paced the Tank attack with four goals and one assist. WO1 Mickey Maguire, the smoothie from Ottawa in the middle of the other armoured line, also picked up five points, four of them assists.

Another ace sniper was Lt. Al Kuntz, ex-New York Ranger, who got three goals and one assist. He was the fastest man on the ice. Jimmy Boddy from Owen Sound, working at right wing with Maguire and Kuntz in place of injured Glen Brydson, picked three points.

#### JIMMY FOWLER SHINES

Despite the array of talent on the A33 lineup, 10 players without a weak spot no less, the most dangerous man on the ice was Sgt. Jimmy Fowler of the Air Force, former popular defenceman for Toronto Maple Leafs, Toronto and St. Catharines Senior OHA teams. Jimmy was a one-man gang out there, defensively and offensively, and worked himself to the limit

but he lacked the player support the other team had.

The RCAF club was by no means weak. The airmen put up a real good show all the way. They had two nice forwards in Bert Voss and Hugh Hardy, former Montreal seniors, and FO Roy Bedard, another from Quebec hockey, showed plenty of class in his first game but was obviously short on condition after only two short workouts.

A33 haven't lost a game this season. They have been taking the opposition by at least 10 goals each game, including Owen Sound Orphans and the A22 Medicals. So that No. 1 SFTS is not outclassed in this league and will likely improve right along as more practice is gained.

Taylor played well in the nets for the losers, despite the 11 goals that went past him. Flyers held the Rams even for about half the first period, then faded and finished 5-1 down. They did much better in the middle session, holding the speeding tankers to a pair of tallies. In the final stanza Capt. Cook's boys garnered four more. It was a clean game. A33 got four of the five minor penalties.

For the past two years SL Gilmour was at Camp Borden in various posts, including acting Chief Flying Instructor for a time. He is a graduate of the RCAF War Staff College, Armour Heights.
