Ottawa, 22nd January, 1910.

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the ISth Instant, respecting the Timber on Cape Croker Reserve, and in reply to inform you that your statements do not agree with the report of the Ferest Bailiff, who has reported in regard to the damaged Timber on the Centre Bhuff - that "he and you went one quarter of the way across it and only found four trees destroyed "by fire, and as the snow was very soft he could not go "all the way around".

In November last a strip was blazed across the bluff and around the rock taking in all the trees which you and Mr. Currie thought were damaged by fire, and it is understood you gave Permits to cut the Timber thereon, to the Indians.

Your report says that for a few rods
back from the brow of the gill, the trees have been
completely killed, and if such is the case, you may
apportion it to Indians who have not been provided with
Permits for such limited quantities, as you consider
advisable and fair, but care should be taken that the
line blased around the bruned trees does not exceed the
