was preceptor of the Canterbury Diocesan Choral Union
1868-75, but performed no clerical duties, except as an
occasional assistant or substitute during the later years
of his life, his time being devoted to literature and lec-
turing. He twice visited the United States,—in 1882,
on an invitation from the Lowell Institute, of Boston,
when he made a very successful lecturing tour in 1883,
and again in 1884. A biography of him by his son,
