### MACAULAY CLUB

The Macaulay Club on Saturday evening debated the relative merits of Washington and Cromwell as generals and as statesmen. H. D. Smith, Crown Attorney, who presided, decided that the affirmative had proved that Washington was the greater statesman, but that the negative had succeeded in maintaining that Cromwell was the greater general. As, however, the onus of proving both lay upon the affirmative, he was compelled to give the decision to the negative. Ex-Ald. Thomas Scullard, Fred. Stone and J. W. Young spoke for the affirmative, and Washington, C. E. Beeston, F. D. Laurie and J. S. Lane contra. Critic, H. W. Anderson.

### May Have Two Tunnels.

Detroit, March 6.—It is quite possible that the Grand Trunk, Canadian Pacific, Pere Marquette and probably the Wabash, will unite to build another tunnel or a bridge. It is definitely announced that the Michigan Central will build a tunnel, but, as a prominent railway man here expresses it, the tunnel should be an international project, so constructed that all roads would have the use of it.

### Another Liberal Gain.

London, March 6.—The Liberals captured a seat as a result of the bye-election in Butehire Saturday, when Norman Lamont secured a majority of 34 over the Unionist candidate, Edward T. Salvesen, the Solicitor-General for Scotland. The election was due to the elevation of Andrew Graham Murray to the peerage on his appointment to a judgeship.
