GAINED POWER OF SPEECH.

Teaching the Dumb to Speak in Will-

iam Morris School.

After 12 months' tuition a boy in the William Morris School for Deaf and Dumb Children at Walthamstow has regained the power of speech, and been transferred to the ordinary schools, says Lloyd's London Weekly. His name is Ernest Palm Proudfoot, and he is not yet 10 years of age. He is not deaf at all, though an uncle of his is both deaf and dumb. He is a strong, healthy boy, and his recovery of speech has been a source of great satisfaction to his mother and his teacher alike.

The latter is Mr. Smith, whose methods of training are particularly interesting. The children are taught to watch the lips of their teacher—half the secret of success lies in this lightnunge. The other half consists in

Deaf mutes have a particularly fine sense of touch, which is an invaluable factor in the system of training; certainly without it their progress would be very slow indeed. But as it is, they make astonishing progress in the art of articulatine, and, as in the case of Proudfoot, they pass from letter to words, to phrases, to the complets sentence, and so learn to talk.

Amongst the institutions founded for the welfare of the deaf and dumb a unique position is held by the East End Social Club, the only Jewish club of the kind in the world. A new feature has been introduced at the club in the form of evening classes, which have been opened under the control of the London County Council. The younger members receive once a week lessons in reading, writing and arithmetic. A needlework class also meets weekly, and the members, in addition, attend classes at various schools in the neighborhood for gymnastics, woodcarving and wood-work. A club entertainment was given on Saturday in Aldgate Avenue, when lantern views were explained by means of signs and lip-reading.

The retirement of Right Hon, George Wyndham, Conservative member in the British House of Commons for Dover, from his post of Chief Secretary for Ireland, is caledhated to seriously embarrass the Balfour Government, with its relatively small and fluctuating majority. Mr. Wyndham has not yet personally explained his reason for retiring, but Premier Balfour, in the House, explained that his principal reason hay in his belief that the recent



controversy inside and outside the House respecting his Local Government schemes had greatly impaired, if mot entirely destroyed, the value of the work he could perform, as Chief Secretary for Ireland. He was appointed to that post in 1969. Mr. Wyndham has represented Dover since 1889, and was private Secretary to Mr. Balfour from 1887 to 1892. From 1883 to 1900 he was Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for War, and entered the Cabinet in 1902. He is also a director of the London, Chatham & Dover Railway, and is a Captain in the Cheshire Yeomanry. His recreations include fox-hunting, shooting and cycling. Mr. Wyndham's mother was a granddaughter of Lord Edward FitzGerald, the great Irish rebel of '98. RIGHT MON. GEORGE WYNDHAM.

Russia's Popular Assembly.

During the next hundred years the Assembly met sevent times, but its chief claim to historic importance lies in the fact that it founded the Romanoff Dynasty.

In the seventeenth century Catherine II. summoned a commission made up of all classes in the Empire, including soldiers, militiamen, peasants and representatives of the tribes not included in the general society of the land. This Assembly numbered 652 delegates and spent two years in deliberations, which produced little result beyond the explosion of much fine sentiment fuspired by the Empiress, who was a papil of Voltairs. An interesting experiment was recently performed in one of our colleges.
