Deadly Explosion of Gas.

Huntington, W. Va., April 28.—Three persons were probably fatally injured, three others badly hurt, and at least two are buried under the ruins of the Moorman building, which was wrecked yesterday by a gas explosion which caused damage estimated at \$100,000. The explosion was the result of the ignition of the escape of natural gas.

Smothered by His Clothes.

Raymond, N. W. T., April 28.—The baby son of John Bennett, of Magrath, fell into an auger hole, bored for water on the farm of A. Wilcox, at Tabor, Wednesday. He fell feet first in the hole and was smothered by his clothes packing around his head. The hole is only 5 feet deep. The child's head was only a foot below the surface.

Reid May Sell.

Montreal, April 28.—Although R. G. Reid would make no statement last night, he reports from St. John, that he will sell his railway and shipping interests to the Newfoundland Government, it is known here that the Bond ministry are anxious to buy Reid out, and the probability is that a deal of this kind is on the tapis.

Suicide at Peterboro.

Peterboro, April 28.—In a fit of despondency, Mrs. Michael Lavery, of 222 King street, took a dose of Paris green and died from the effects of the drug at 1:30 yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Lavery had been mentally deranged for some time, having but recently left St. Joseph's Hospital.

Burned to Death at 92.

Utica, N. Y., April 28.—Miss Nancy Petrie, in her 92nd year, was burned to death yesterday in the yard of her brother's residence at Pine Grove, near Herkimer. Her clothing caught from a bonfire, and she was dead when the accident was discovered.

Must Hang.

Montreal, April 28.—The Court of King's Bench yesterday quashed the appeal of Foquet, convicted of murdering his step-child at La Patrie, Que., and sentenced to death. Foquet will be taken to Sherbrooke for execution.
