IN MACKENZIE'S REBELLION.

Wm. Duffield, Who Died at Guelph, Played a Part.

Guelph, Aug. 4.—Wm. Duffield, one of the pioneer settlers of Eramosa, died at the General Hospital on Saturday evening at the age of 80. He is the last of a family of Duffields that came here in 1832. He was a fine specimen of a Yorkshireman, and, like his brothers, who have predeceased him, was fond of the rod and gun. Deceased assisted in carrying ammunition during the time of the Mackenzie rebellion, and had a narrow escape from capture. He leaves a daughter, Mrs. H. Horlop, and a son Charles, on the old homestead.
