lley of The cockchafers accordingly multiplied to such an extent that an entire meadow was pointed out to me as completely withered on the surface. The larvæ had pushed so far their subterranean works, that every root of grass had been eaten, and all the turf could be rolled back on itself like a carpet. The multiplication of insects is almost incredible, but our birds seem equal to the emergency. Michilet says: "The swallow is not satisfied with less than 1,000 flies per diem; a pair of sparrows carry home to their young 43,000 caterpillars weekly; a tomtit, 300 daily. The magpie hunts after the insects which lie concealed beneath the bark of the tree and live upon its sap. The humming-bird and the fly-catcher purify the chalice of the flower. The bee-eater, in all lands, carries on a fierce hostility with the wasp which ruins our fruits. A large number of insects remains during the winter in the egg or larvæ, waiting for the spring to burst into life; but in this state they are diligently hunted by the mavis, the wren, and the troglodtyte. The former turn over the leaves which strew the earth; the latter climb to the loftiest branches of the trees, or clean out the trunk. In wet meadows the crows and storks bore the ground to seize the white worm which, for three years before metamorphosing into cockchafer, gnaws at the root of our grasses .- The Animal Kingdom.
