CATHEDRAL LEAGUE.

The annual meeting of St. Alban's Cathedral League was held in the Cathedral Library, Tuesday, May 14th, at 3 p.m. Mrs. Sweatman, President of the League, was in the chair. There was a large and enthusiastic gathering present, and the full and encouraging reports were listened to with great interest. Secretary gave a sketch of the League's work from its inception eighteen months ago till the present time, which indicated both steady progress and a widening interest in the work and objects of the League. The following officers were elected: President, Mrs. Sweatman; Vice-Presidents, Mrs. Macnab, Mrs. Arthurs, Mis: Canavan; Secretary, Mrs. Charles Clarke; Treasurer, Mrs. W. S. Howard. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to the retiring Secretary, Miss Chowne, for her untiring interest and indefatigable work. After the meeting His Grace the Archbishop and Mrs. Sweatman received the members of the League and their friends at the See House.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

More than a year and a half ago one or two members of St. Alban's Cathedral feeling the great need of something being done through an organized effort among the women, and being encouraged by the example of the S. A. School Boys, who had assumed the responsibility of one pier, the St. Alban's Cathedral

League was formed on the 17th of November, 1905, when some thirty of us met in this Library with the object, as it is given on our membership cards, to promote in every way the interests and work of the Cathedral of the Diocese, and to undertake the securing of five dollars annually towards the Cathedral Extension Fund, and also to subscribe \$1.00, or 25c. quarterly, to the Bishop's Envelopes. It was decided that we should become responsible for one of the two larger piers, which we understand is to cost something like \$2000. It might be well to mention here that through the Cathedral League some seventy or eighty new subscribers to the Bishop's Envelopes have been secured in a comparatively short time. In this way we may feel that we have lightened the Archbishop's burden a little. We have two branches of the League, St. Alban's of course, and one at Holy Trinity, which Mrs. Clougher, the Parochial Vice-President in Charge, has quietly worked up among her friends, and I am quite sure that if we had a few more such truly interested branches in other parishes of . this city and throughout the Diocese our dear Cathedral would very soon be extended. Of course, we have members of the League, but not branches, in other parishes, among which are St. Simon's, St. Paul's, The Church of The Redeemer, All Saints', St. Anne's, St. Augustine's, and Christ Church, Deer Park. These have been secured as personal friends among ourselves, and have shown their interest in the past in St. Alban's. We have decided that a band of five members under a Parochial Vice-President shall comprise a Branch. At present it is not necessary that the five members shall all be in the one parish. A Parochial Vice-President in Charge becomes an officer of the Leagne and has a voice in all matters. Won't some of you now present resolve to go forth and help the work of the extension by securing members in your own parishes? It is a duty which we each owe to our Church. Of course, as would naturally be expected, the St. Alban's Branch of the League, under the able and energetic management of its Vice-President in Charge, Miss Canavan, has by far the largest number of members. At the suggestion of Mrs. Arthurs, our 2nd. Vice-President, the Talent system was introduced and most enthusiastically taken up, as you will understand when I tell you that at our first Exhibition of Talent Work, which was held in the. largest room of St. Alban's School late in the autumn of 1905, the exhibits were so many and varied, anything from lace to jellied meats, and the exhibitors and people who had come to see so numerous, that we felt the absolute necessity of securing much more spacious quarters last year when the Second Exhibition of Talent Work was held. This time we were comfortable in the Crypt, which was made very pretty for the This time we took the children under our wing, and they had a sale table of their own, the proceeds of which went towards the Sunday School Pier, for which they are working faithfully. Mrs. Clougher, Vice-President in Charge of our Holy Trinity Branch, also had a table, so you see the exhibition was not only the means of helping us to secure orders for the various work displayed, but was the means of bringing together many outside people, who became interested in our work of extension. I said just now "work displayed;" work which has come most tastefully to the fore. Who
