United States.

In Massachusetts the last election turned

largely upon the question of prohibition.

The result was the victory of the usual State no  
tional ticket from 40,000 to

27,000, and the election of thirteen Democratic  
Senators, where they had none before, and  
only four to the Lower House, where they had  
none before. Bullock, the Republican Governor  
gained his election; but all through the State  
there have been large Democratic gains. Bos  
ton gave a majority to the Democrats. The  
Democratic party in the State of New York  
is about 45,000.

In New York and Brooklyn the Democratic  
party was elected, the former city giving a major  
ity of 20,000. The Legislature is Democratic.

In New Jersey the Democratic majority is  
about 10,000. The Legislature is Democratic  
in both branches.

Maryland elected the entire Democratic  
ticket. O'Brien is elected Governor over  
H. S. Bell, (Republican), by about 40,000 major  
ity.

WISCONSIN—Fairchild, (Republican), has  
been re-elected Governor. The Legislature is  
Republican.

MISSOURI—Fayrhill, (Republican), has  
been re-elected Governor. The Legislature is  
re-elected.

KANSAS has probably gone Republican by a  
small majority. The "feminist" and "negro  
suffrage" bills were both defeated.
