The Petitioners therefore most humbly pray this House to reftore to them their former privilege, by a re-establishment of the Court to be held at that Place, in its course, as well as at St *Denis*: for the convenience whereof the Inhabitants of that Borough and Parish are willing to build a decent and commodious Court-house on the lot of land already allowed by Government in that Town, for the fame.
