## WARDEN HUBBELL

## WAS CANED

Members of County Council and Offi-

cials Show Appreciation.

Last week Toronto was thronged  
with visitors from all over Ontario  
who were in attendance at the vari-  
ous Conventions in session there. One  
of these was the members of Hast-  
ings County Council who had been  
given a trip to the Annual Meeting of  
the Good Roads Association of On-  
tario, by Warden Hubbell, and the  
county and county officials. The visit  
which made them so conspicuous  
among the hundreds who filled the  
leading hotels.

Thursday morning when the County  
legislators and officials gathered to do  
honor to Warden Hubbell. His Honor
