Nels has felt the necessity of some such grounds, and a movement is now on foot there to form a joint stock company with a capitalization of \$30,000 for the purpose of acquiring the necessary land and putting it in shape. Rossland has a very great advantage over Nelson in this connection by rea son of the fact that the grounds are already in the possession of the cor-poration and the nature of the available tract is such that a comparatively insignificant expenditure would put the land into proper condition. The location of the proposed park, within ten minutes walk of the courthouse is one

of its strongest recommendations.

T. is that an unfair restriction is placed on mercantile houses in the city as against saloons, inasmuch as merchants in the grocery boots and shoes, hardware lines, etc., are compelled to keep their doors closed to customers after 6:30 p.m. on most nights of each week and all day Sunday, while saloons are open seven days in the week and twenty-four hours in the day. The contention is made that if saloons are to be permitted to cater for trade at all hours merchants are reasonably entitled to the same privi- a grant of \$500 for this purpose.
