THE COAL SITUATION.

A long list of cases were heard by his Worship this morning in the police court.

Nick Bom Bom was up, charged with assaulting the police. He was on quite a spree, and when the P.C. tried to gather him in he started a fight, which cost him \$7.85.

Frank Eiting was charged with stealing a pair of rubber boots. The evidence was not taken. He will appear on the 19th.

Jennie Steves charged her husband Mike Steves, with assault. When the evidence was heard, however, the defendant was found not entirely to blame. The trouble started over letters he found from her to another man and replies from the said man. His Worship, after reading these, decided she was partly to blame. Plaintiff, however, said she would rather go to jail than live with him. His Worship said it was not necessary to do either. They were both convinced they would get along better singly, and his Worship was of the same opinion, so they were separated.

J. W. Pierson, a billed man, secured a bottle of rum at the Kerby, knowing he was billed. He said he secured it for his wife, who was sick at home. The story was an old one. His Worship thought, and so Pierson was forced to pay the \$12.85.

Bert Meates and John Montgomery made restitution to the extent of \$30 to Eli Loser for theft of a horse, but they were also assessed \$8.85 each, court costs. Montgomery claims he thought the stable was Meates' stable all the time.
