ONE LESS AT THE KIEL CANAL

BLYTH, England, May 14, 12.53 p.m.—A German submarine is reported to have been sunk in the North Sea. The captain of the steamer Collairnie, on reaching port to-day, stated his vessel apparently had destroyed the submarine by running it down off the Northumberland coast.

FRENCH OFFICIAL NOTICE

Paris, May 14.—2.31 p.m.—The French war office this afternoon issued the following statement on the progress of hostilities: "It has been raining without stop since yesterday morning. Last night, in spite of the handicap of a difficult and slippery terrain, we occupied several German trenches to the southwest of Souchez and we have maintained on the rest of the front from Loos to Arras all the gains recently made by us."

WAR FEVER IS NOW GROWING MORE INFLAMED TO-DAY

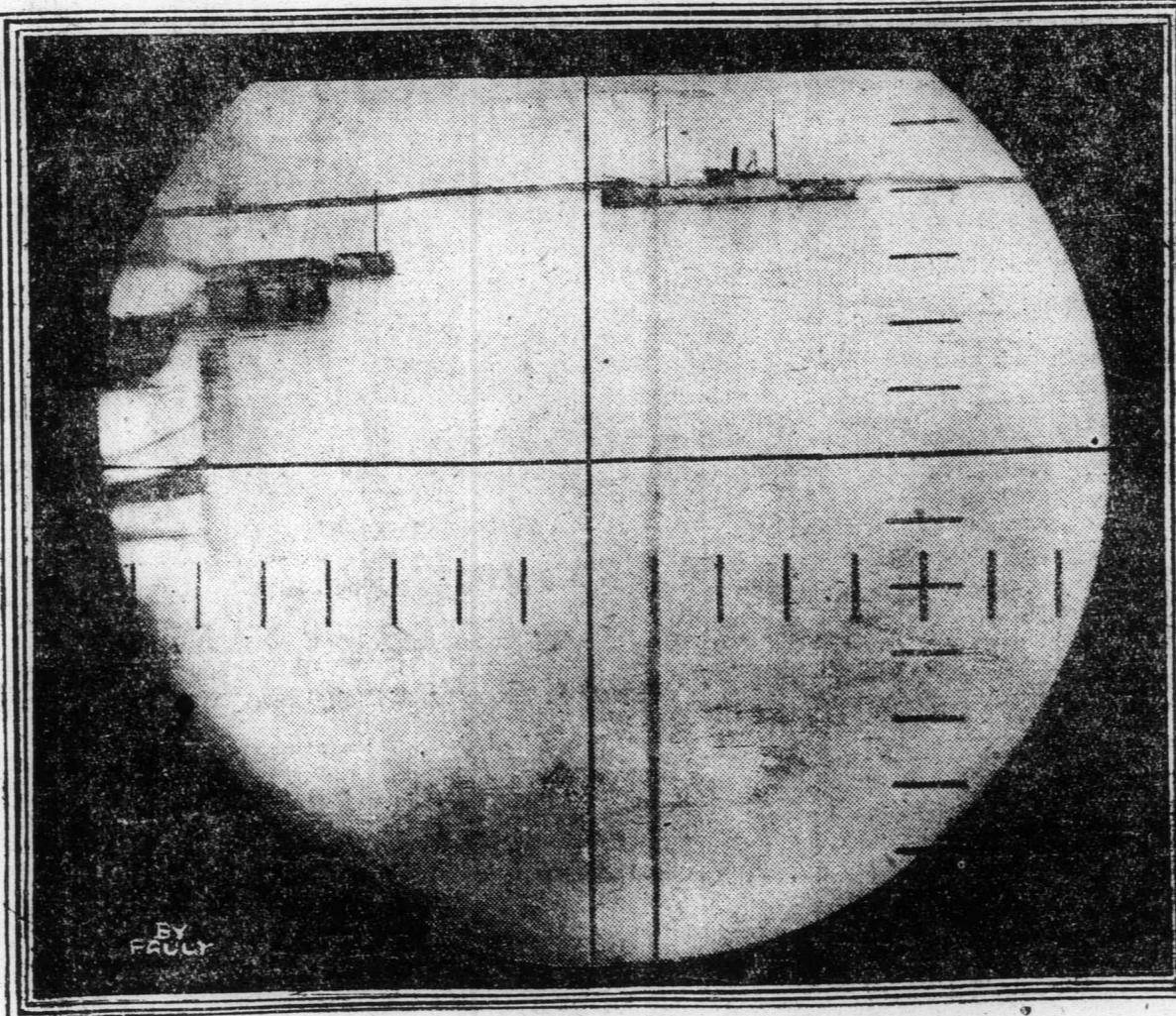
Italian People Clamor For War and Threaten Germans—Can the King Act Contrary to this Expressed Will?

A crowd which favored Italy's intervention went last night to the hotel at which Gabriele D'Annunzio is stopping and cheered until the poet appeared on a balcony and spoke unreservedly in favor of war.
