



St. Petersburg, March 25 .- In connection with the students "freedom" meeting at Moscow alone 95 have been banished from Siberia and 567 imprisoned, including doctors, lawyers, 'noblemen, noblewomen, and sons and daughters of high officials. Mrs. Gardner and son Boris, Ameri-
