Russian Aviators at Constantinople, It is Reported from Athens

Paris—A Havas despatch from Athens says it is reliably stated there that two Russian hydro-aeroplanes operated over Constantinople on Monday night.
A German aeroplane flew over the island of Imbros, in the Aegean Sea, yesterday, throwing bombs at the lighthouse on Point Kephalos. No serious damage was caused, however.

London, April 27—The British submarine E-22 has been sunk in the North Sea, the Admiralty announced this afternoon. Only two of her crew were saved.

The E-22 was a submarine built from an Admiralty design. She carried four torpedo tubes, had a surface speed of sixteen knots and a submerged speed of ten knots and her full complement was sixteen men. Fourteen lives have been lost with her sinking.

Success of the Russians.

Petrograd, via London.—The official communication, issued from general headquarters today reads:
"East of Riga, in the Kurten region, the enemy artillery repeatedly bombarded the railway. Our aerial squadron bombarded the enemy electric station at Komey, northwest of Lake Narozs region."
"Caucasus front: The fighting in the Rivanruza region continues, Kurds, who attempted to attack our convoys, were dispersed in a successful action by our troops, notably a detachment of forty-four Cossacks who surprised a Kurdish bivouac near the village of Zova and surrounded and killed 150 Kurds, including a Molloch, safely rejoining their regiment with the loss of only two killed and one missing."

Horse Breeding

The Secretary for Agriculture at Truro is in receipt of a telegram from the Canada National Live Stock Records in which he is urged to do everything in his power to get farmers to raise all the horses they can this year. Ottawa authorities claim that everything points to a big shortage in horse flesh ere long and they therefore strongly advise farmers to get ready by breeding as many colts as they can.

Household Hints

Tomato skins will clean such kitchen ware as the sheet iron frying pans that have become blackened with use so that they will look like new.

To polish aluminum make a mixture of borax ammonia and water. Apply with a soft cloth. Lightning Stroke—If the patient is unconscious apply artificial respiration at once and continue for a lengthy period—if necessary, for one or two hours—until natural breathing is resumed. Remove all clothing quickly and dash the body with cold water; then dry the patient and place him in bed. Apply hot-water bottles and warm cloths, especially to the pit of the stomach. When consciousness returns, administer brandy or aromatic spirits of ammonia.

To Clean Brass—An excellent way of cleaning brass flower pots or trays is to rub them well with a piece of lemon. Then pour boiling water over them, and finally polish them with a dry cloth. You will find that the juice of the lemon will remove all the stains from the crevices in the brass.

To clean a corset make a suds of hot water borax and a tablespoonful of ammonia. Scrub the corset clean, rinse in hot water, then in cold, and hang on the line in the sun to bleach and thoroughly dry.

To whiten the skin make a paste of buttermilk and oatmeal (not rolled oats); cover the face and neck just before bedtime and allow to remain on all night. Wash off in the morning with tepid water. Repeat till face is sufficiently bleached.

Poisoning

In case of sickness from eating poisonous berries or impure food, send for a physician promptly. While he is coming, give the patient an emetic at once. A teaspoonful of ground mustard dissolved in a cupful of warm water is most satisfactory; but plain salt water or lukewarm water alone in large quantities is also effective. After vomiting has taken place, let patient swallow the white of several eggs or some sweet oil to help absorb the poison. Also give a simple cathartic, such as castor oil, and follow with a good enema of warm water after the cathartic has acted. Let the patient drink plenty of water, and keep him on a diet of milk and toast for twenty-four hours.

When Laying Matting

When you put down a new matting, do not cut it to fit corners, wet it thoroughly with a soft brush or cloth dipped in hot water to which a cupful of salt has been added. When thoroughly soaked the matting becomes pliable as rubber, and can be turned without breaking. This makes a neater finish than cutting, and also saves the matting for use in a different shaped room.

Ink stains are almost impossible to remove from the hands with soap and water, but if one will dampen the head of an ordinary match and rub it over the ink stains, they will disappear as if by magic.
