

PROVINCIAL CONSERVATIVES GATHER HERE TO-DAY

Saskatchewan Convention Sits in City Hall--Representative Gathering--Mass Meeting To-Night in Auditorium Rink--Mr. Borden Will Speak on Federal Issue

The Conservatives of Saskatchewan meet here in convention today and although the gathering is called at a very busy season it promises to be fairly representative. Delegates from outlying provincial points reached the city yesterday. The Conservative leader, Mr. R. L. Borden will be present he having arrived here yesterday accompanied by Hon. Messrs. Bergeson, Reid and Lake. The convention is being held in the city hall and a mass meeting will be held in the Auditorium rink in the evening when Mr. Borden will speak on the federal issues and will be supported by the other gentlemen accompanying him. Mr. Borden has had large audiences at all his meetings and the gathering here this evening will be no exception in point of enthusiasm and attendance.

TURGEON BEATEN IN PRINCE ALBERT

Bradshaw Defeats Attorney-General Turgeon--Scott Government Feels the Blow Very Keenly--Many Votes Tied Up But Bradshaw Expects Majority

Prince Albert, Oct. 15.—What will likely prove to be a death blow to the Scott government was the distinguished victory of J. E. Bradshaw who defeated Mr. Turgeon, the government candidate and attorney general by a majority of four in the by-election here on Saturday last. The government had used every influence which could be brought to bear on the situation but they failed to get a majority. The city was over-run with government officials, both provincial and federal for several days and they were active till the close of the polls. Premier Scott was here for a couple of days; Mr. Calder personally supervised the organization,

on by Mr. Bradshaw's friends to guard the ballot boxes against a repetition of the crooked work that was practised in the general elections. Both Mr. James McKay and Mr. Bradshaw went to Fred McGuire the returning officer and proposed that ballot boxes be placed in a bank

BRADSHAW FIVE AHEAD

Prince Albert, Oct. 15.—When the court of revision opened today there was rough house for a time owing to S. McLeod being the presiding magistrate. Messrs. McKay, Adam and Doak appeared for Mr. Bradshaw, and J. A. Calder and Judge McGuire for Mr. Turgeon. Objection was taken to McLeod sitting and it was then intimated that the court would likely be cleaned out by Mr. Bradshaw's supporters if justice were denied. It is claimed by Liberals that of the thirteen votes allowed, six are for them. This makes Mr. Bradshaw's majority five.

 The fight was perhaps the most bitter that was fought out in this province, and every precaution was taken

after the close of the poll for safe keeping. Mr. McGuire wrote a note to Mr. Bradshaw resenting his suggestion. It was then announced that if anything crooked were attempted the returning officer would have to bear the consequences and a committee was organized to watch the place night and day where the ballot boxes were stored. Later, however, Mr. McGuire gave way to the entreaty of his opponents and provision was made to store the boxes in the vault of the Bank of Ottawa. Notwithstanding this, however, the box from one poll was taken by W. T. Gilmore and James Clare
