Stock was short in his accounts to the extent of nearly \$9,000. Mr. Stock frankly admitted that he used the county funds. In addition to his official position, he carried on a general store in Waterdown and drove into the city to his office every day. The Waterdown business has not been paying and Mr. Stock has been helping himself to the county's funds for years to keep up the general store. His sureties are John Stock, of East Flamboro', Thomas Stock, of Dundas, Geo. Smith and John Welr, of East Flamboro', and himself, and they are jointly and severally bound in the sum of \$30,000. The exact amount of the shortage is said to be \$8,88 and this amount has been made good by the sureties. Mr. Stock has been treasurer of the county for 18 years and received as salary \$1,200 a year. He was considered one of the most upright men in the county. At times he has handled as much as \$90,000 and though his sureties were only bound for one-third of this amount, not the slightest doubt ever entered the minds of those who knew him that the money was not perfectly safe in his hands.
