Mr. Gordon resigned and the remaining three were declared elected by acclamation.

Following the expiry of the nomination hour, Mr. S. A. Taplin was voted to the chair and an interesting discussion of municipal matters followed.

The reeve and councillors Purcell and Judson gave a brief account of their stewardship, as reflected in the financial statement, and the reeve also spoke in reply to criticism offered respecting minor expenditure.

Two subjects were prominent in all the speeches delivered, viz: permanent sidewalks and street lighting. All were agreed that further expenditures on plank walks would be unwise, and Mr. Parish, Mr. Arnold and others advocated the adoption of a local improvement law, funds for the carrying out of which to be provided by the issuing of debentures. It was pointed out that the amount now expended yearly on plank walks would more than pay the interest on money raised for permanent walks.

The whole tone of the meeting constituted a mandate to the incoming council to make a radical change in the expenditure of money on sidewalk walks.

Qualification papers were put in by only A. M. Eaton, E. J. Purcell, A. E. McLean and E. Taylor for councillors and by M. B. Holmes for reeve, so these by acclamation will constitute Athens' council board for 1908.
