FALSE REPORT.

London, May 30.—There is no truth in the report published in the United States that the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, will resign after the coronation, owing to the persistence of the Colonial Secretary, Joseph Chamberlain, in the retention of the grain tax as preliminary to his sovereign scheme.

A SYMPATHETIC STRIKE.

Toronto, Ont., May 30.—Following the failure yesterday to come to a settlement of the structural iron workers' strike, the federal building trades council has decided to take a hand in the fight. To-day about 45 men were called out on a sympathetic strike from the new works of the Canada Foundry Company at Toronto Junction. The men called out comprise carpenters, tinmiths, painters, bricklayers and plumbers. A number of non-union iron workers were working on the job and it is with these that the union men of other trades refuse to work.

A CRASH OF CARS.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., May 30.—A car carrying 40 passengers and a freight car, collided on the New Paltz & Poughkeepsie Electric Railway two miles from the Highland this afternoon, and a dozen passengers were badly hurt. The ends of both cars were crushed in and some of the passengers were caught in the wreckage. Mortimer Emory Ayer had both legs broken, and four young women sustained fractured legs and severe cuts in different parts of their bodies. The accident was caused by one of the cars neglecting to remain on a switch until the other had passed.

MYSTERIOUS DEATH.

Toronto, May 30.—The authorities are seeking to strip the death of Edward Wilkinson, a property man at the Grand Opera House of the mystery surrounding it. Wilkinson, who was 40 years of age, and lived alone, was found in a dying condition in his room, 133 King street east, to-day, with a great wound in the back of his head. Friends say they believe Wilkinson had a fall on the street on election night, and afterwards was seen to go home, but if this is the case, it is somewhat remarkable that a man injured as he was could walk and find his home.

PRISON WORK.

Staff-Captain Archibald, of Toronto, Secretary to Prisons, will give an address on Prison Work in the Salvation Army barracks on Monday evening, June 2nd. The Staff-Captain is at present time attending an International Convention of Correction and Charities in the city of Detroit, where matters of importance in connection with Prison Work is being brought up. The Staff-Captain is an interesting speaker and the public should avail themselves of the opportunity of hearing him. Four years ago the Staff-Captain was in charge of the work of the local corps in Chatham.

The Pimpernel.
