It Is In Arizona and Dates From the Seventeenth Century.

St. Augusting is the oldest town in the United States, but the oldest hotel in the country, contrary to what one would expect, is not in the east at all, but as far west as Arizona, being situated in Phenix of that state.

The hotel is a long, low, one story affair, built of adobe, with a flat roof, low doorways and many paned windows.
