The Elections.

The federal elections on Thursday resulted in a sweeping victory for the Liberal party. In this province every county returns a supporter of the government, the leader of the opposition being defeated among the rest by a substantial majority.

The election of Hon. Geo. E. Foster in North Toronto, returns to parliament a man whom every well wisher of the country will rejoice to see again in the house.

Town Council Meeting. The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening, with the Mayor, Coss, Tingley, Fitch, Duncanson and Wallace present.

The chairman of the Streets Committee presented a verbal report of routine work done during the month. The Mayor called attention to certain complaints made by him of needed repairs on Highland avenue and Pleasant street, and requested the committee to attend to same.

Written reports were presented by the Poor and Sewerage Committees. The Mayor stated, on behalf of the chairman of the Police and License Committees, that during the week one license fee of fifty dollars had been collected from business carrying on a clothing business in the town.

The committee on public scales reported, recommending that a site for scale be selected on the north-west corner of Highland avenue and Main street. The Mayor stated the cost of scales as \$62 landed in Wolfville, and probably \$25 would cover expense of installation.

A communication was read from the secretary of the Law and Order League, enclosing resolutions passed at the last meeting of the League asking the attention of the Council to the need of more efficient police of the town, and that action be taken to provide efficient police service for Thursday evening.

The League also called attention of Council to the apparent prevalence of incendiary fires in the town, and asking that a proper investigation be held.

Rev. A. Coburn, on behalf of the League, addressed the Council in support of the resolutions.

Mr. J. D. Chambers, who with quite a number of the other members of the League were present, also addressed the Council, along the same line, as did other members.

A resolution was passed authorizing the Police Committee to engage as many extra policemen as is necessary to maintain good order in town during Thursday evening.

Resolved that the Council authorize the Police Committee to engage an extra policeman to assist in keeping order in the town for such time as they deem necessary.

The following resolution was passed: Whereas fire has occurred in certain buildings in town from time to time, and in the opinion of some of the citizens these fires have been of incendiary origin; therefore Resolved, that a reward of \$20.00 be offered to any one who will give evidence that will lead to the conviction of any of the guilty parties, if such there be. The same reward to apply to any fire that may occur in the future from incendiary origin.

Executions and Elections.

Up to a quite recent period there was a general impression abroad in the county that the Municipal elections of this month would result in the return without opposition of the greater number of the members of the last council. Within the last few days however, an organized movement has been made to effect a change in the personnel of the council, and to that end, nominations have been made in a number of the wards in opposition to the retiring councillors. To this action, viewed by itself, no one has a right to object. There are whippers however, of a purpose which should be known to the electors before they poll their votes.

Since the recent execution in Kentville a demand has been continuously made for an investigation into the disorderly conduct said to have taken place on that occasion. It was felt that, if the charges were true, the blot on the fair fame of our county might be in part removed by the exposure and punishment of the guilty parties. If not true, an investigation would relieve the county, as well as the persons charged with the disorderly conduct, from the stigma resting upon them.

The persons whose official duty it would seem to be to initiate proceedings for such an investigation seemed strangely unwilling to take action. Recently it began to be whispered that when the accounts against the municipality for services in connection with that execution came before the council in January, an investigation would be demanded by that council before those accounts were passed. This report was immediately followed by the announcement that strenuous opposition would be made to the return of some of our most active of the former councillors, and the nominations of Tuesday confirm the announcement.

If the people of the county desire an investigation of the truth of the charge that the death of Robinson was more like a yanking than an execution, they should demand from the candidates for the councilship a pledge that, if elected, they will see that, so far as the council has power, such investigation will be had.—Register.

Obituary.

MRS. PURLEY FLETCHER, B. A. The death of Edson Purley Fletcher a former graduate of Acadia and at one time well known in Wolfville, occurred at his home in Debert on Oct. 16th, in his 43rd year.

When eleven years old he entered the Halifax School for the Blind, and in due time graduated. He then taught music for a few years in Yarmouth, Digby and Lunenburg. After two years at Acadia College in the class of '89, he returned to the School for the Blind, and taught for two years. Resuming his college course he graduated with the class of '91. His superior abilities rendered study a delight and his many and genial qualities as the College men of that day will bear witness, secured the love of all who knew him. After receiving his B. A. he again returned to the School for the Blind, and for about three years had in charge the literary department. In the meantime he had not neglected his musical studies, and now in preparation for a long-cherished purpose he left the School for the Blind and placing himself under the distinguished Prof. MacLean, then teaching in Truro. For a year he gave himself unreservedly to music, practising from seven to ten hours daily.

On New Year's day, 1894, he had married Miss Christie A. McKenzie, of Pictou, who was then residing in Halifax, and at the close of his studies under Prof. MacLean, Mr. Fletcher and his wife removed to Brandon, Man., where he taught music for a living, and did his utmost in the furtherance of his great ambition, the establishment of a School for the Blind in that Province. He gave an object lesson by teaching a blind girl, who when Mr. Fletcher died the cause of the blind before the Cabinet Ministers of Manitoba was able to read in the second book, to the astonishment and admiration of the legislators. By untiring efforts he demonstrated the need of a School for the Blind in Manitoba, and removed prejudices and misconceptions in regard to it. But the time was inopportune for government action, owing to the bitter conflict concerning the separate school question. He remained five years in Brandon but in the last year his health gave away and in hope of improvement from a change they went to Victoria, B. C., where Dr. Hall, the specialist, performed an operation for appendicitis. After two years in Victoria, and still suffering from a complication of the diseases, which gave no hope of relief he returned to his old home at Debert. Though he suffered constantly his admirable courage and patience never took him, nor that cheerfulness that made him the ideal companion. In the home of his boyhood, surrounded by kind brothers, cared for by a loving mother, who was so justly proud of her gifted son, ministered to by his devoted wife, the end came. This a career of no ordinary promise was closed at its mid-day.

SIMON VAUGHAN. A telegram has been received announcing the death at Vancouver on Oct. 26th of Mr. Simon Vaughan a former resident of this town. Deceased, who was about sixty-five years of age, had been an invalid for three or four years. He was a son of the late Benjamin Vaughan, a prominent citizen of St. John. After graduating at Acadia College in 1858 he entered into business in Liverpool England, where he proved himself a most capable commercial man, and for many years was head of the well known firm of S. Vaughan & Co., ship brokers. Many provincialists have pleasant recollections of the open handed hospitality dispensed by Mr. and Mrs. Vaughan at their elegant home in the suburbs of Liverpool. He married Sarah Embee DeWolf, daughter of the late William DeWolf of Amherst, where she was born. Mrs. Vaughan died in Wolfville about eighteen years ago. Retiring from business Mr. Vaughan and family came to Wolfville to reside about twenty years ago, and during their residence here made many warm friends. Some years afterward he removed to Vancouver, where all the members of his family now reside, except his daughter, wife of Rev. S. W. Cummings of Amherst; they are, Mrs. Frank Rounselet, Henry Vaughan, John Vaughan, Florence M. Vaughan, Mrs. Benjamin Vaughan, Wolfville.

mother of the deceased, lives at St. Martins.

MRS. JOSEPH L. MCKENNA. On Sunday morning last, at her home at Kingston, passed away from earth Mrs. Joseph Lovett McKenna. She had been in failing health for some time but not until the last few days did her nearest friends suspect that her end was so near.

Eunice Selome Felch (for that was her name) was born at Nictaux, Annapolis, February 7th, 1824, and was, therefore, over eighty years of age. She was a granddaughter of the late Major Nathaniel Parker, a United Empire Loyalist. She was married to Joseph Lovett McKenna in 1843. A year ago last June they celebrated their diamond jubilee amid the congratulations of a host of enthusiastic friends. For many years Mr. McKenna has been a deacon of the North Kingston Baptist church, and his hospitable home has ever been a trying place for leaders in denominational life—a rendezvous for kindred spirits in the service of his King. Besides her husband, who is now eighty-three years of age, deceased leaves five sons, fifteen grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren. Of the five sons, two are abroad. The three at home are: H. W., a graduate of Acadia university, at Parrsboro; Dr. A. J., one of the board of deacons in the Wolfville Baptist church, and E. J., on the old homestead at Kingston.
