Throughout the territory wherein The Observer circulates the flood has entirely subsided and much less damage resulted than was feared last week. Supt. Gilliland and Bridge Engineer Frank Currie are to be congratulated upon the speed with which they made the repairs on their subdivisions.

Guy Christian of Simonds will at once open a milk route serving the town of Hartland. He has a good herd of Jersey strain cows that have recently passed test for tuberculosis. He will charge 8 cents a quart for milk and will make delivery every morning until warm weather when he will deliver twice a day. Collections made monthly.—47-3.

The biggest order for snap shots that Estey & Curtis Company ever handled is being taken. The pictures of the flood were greeted with orders exceeding even the photographer's expectations. So far 182 have been ordered and the demand is not over yet. These pictures are being finished at the Harvey Studio, Woodstock, and those who order pictures must allow ample time to finish them.

TOWN COUNCIL

The May meeting of the Council was held in the Town hall on May 7, the Mayor presiding.

The Treasurer reported receipts of \$152.70; expenditures \$179.73.

The special committee appointed to report on a hitching stand for horses and found that the lot between the office and Keith & Plummer's store could be secured for \$20 per year and it was decided to rent the place.

J. F. Murdock was reappointed Town Marshal. The marshal reported having arrested eight boys and young men on a charge of disturbing the peace. Three young men were fined \$10 each.

The fire and water committee reported having the pipe and fixture for the extension of the Main Street water main from the corner of Prince and Main street south, 700 feet.

The police committee reported a marked improvement in the order at night and recommended a lock-up be provided.

G. F. Seeley was given permission to erect poles for the purpose of putting up electric light wires.

Harper & Teddie were granted a license to operate their moving pictures three times a week at a fee of \$25 a year.

It was moved that the river bank below the small bridge near the residence of Mrs. S. M. Boyer be used as a town dump and that those who dump refuse there should burn it.

IMPORTANT TOWN NOTICES

The reservoir and water mains which may have been contaminated by flood have been thoroughly washed out and after today the water will be safe to use without boiling.

The Town Marshal insists that the sidewalk at Taylor's corner must in future be kept free from loafers or gatherings that will impede the progress of pedestrians. The sidewalk is what its name implies—a walk, and not a place to congregate for any purpose whatever.

Notice is given that hens must not be allowed to run at large after the first of May.

A town by-law provides that no wheeled vehicle except perambulators shall be allowed on the sidewalk. This applies particularly to wheelbarrows, trucks, bicycles and coasters. It is great fun for the kiddies to use the sidewalks for their play ground, but the habit is becoming a nuisance, and sooner or later someone is going to meet with trouble. It is a great pity that a central play ground, safe and properly supervised by an older person, cannot be secured for the children to play in.

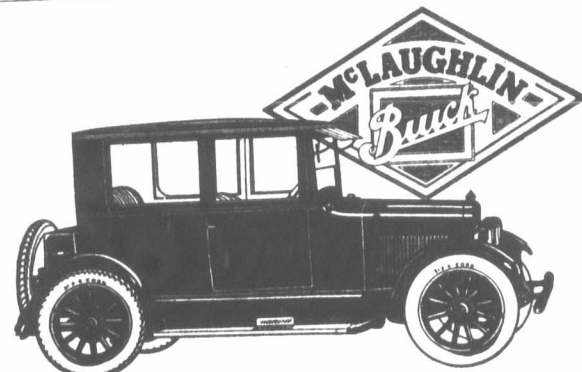
