NEW MAN-POWER BILL

IS PASSED BY SENATE
Washington, Aug. 28.—The man-power bill bringing within the army draft all men from 18 to 45 years old was passed late today by the Senate with a modified work-or-fight clause.

The work-or-fight amendment written into the bill by the Senate military committee was approved by a vote of 40 to 29, with an amendment providing that it shall not apply to strikers who return to work and submit their demands to the War Labor Board.

The test came on a motion by Senator McKellar, of Tennessee, to strike out the clause after the modification, proposed by Senator Cummings, of Iowa, had been adopted 73 to 0.

The British Third and Fourth armies suffered casualties estimated at about 23,500 between August 21 and 25, according to advices from the front. During the same period the German losses in prisoners alone amounted to 20,000 in the battle east of the Ancre.

BREAD SUPERVISOR

ON ISLAND NAMED

Following the visit to the Coast last week of Edward Parnell, of Winnipeg, who is acting for the Canada Food Board, and who held conferences at Victoria, with members of the Bread and Cake Manufacturers' Association, J. T. Taylor, of the firm of Bannister & Taylor, was unanimously chosen as the Supervisor for Vancouver Island. J. E. Plant, Bakeries Inspector for Vancouver City was also selected as Provincial Supervisor. The duties of these appointments will be to see that the regulations affecting bakeries are respected.

Running two days behind schedule the N. Y. K. liner Kamo Maru is expected to reach Victoria from the Orient on Friday. She is bringing in a big passenger list, and apart from her through freight has 482 tons of merchandise for discharge at that port.

Sergeant-Major James Robinson, the first Canadian to win the D.C.M. in the present war, has enrolled for service in the British Columbia contingent of the Canadian-Siberian force. Robinson is a former first vice-president of the G.W.V.A. of Canada.
