PRESBYTERY OF ST. JOHN MEETS

Resignations of Three Ministers Received—Those Who Stay With United Church.

[The Canadian Press.]

St. John, N. B., June 30.—At the meeting of the St. John Presbytery here this morning matters made necessary by the Union of Methodists, Presbyterians and Congregationalists were dealt with.

The first matter taken up was the resignation of Rev. W. A. Ross as minister of the Milltown church. He said he had resigned as he felt this step was necessary in the interests of the Union. Action on the resignation was deferred until this afternoon.

The resignation of Rev. William Swan as minister of the Richmond church said that at Richmond there had been two aid receiving churches, a Methodist and a Presbyterian, and he felt in order to facilitate the work of the Union it was his duty to resign. The resignation was accepted.

A delegation from the W. M. S. asked authority to appoint a new deaconess for St. John was heard. Miss Cora Sinclair, present deaconess, was remaining in the continuing Presbyterian Church.

Rev. J. S. Sutherland, Rev. W. W. Malcolm, Rev. W. J. Bavis, Rev. A. V. Morash, Rev. W. A. Wood, Rev. W. Swan, Rev. P. Jackson, Rev. W. A. Ross, Rev. W. L. Patterson, Rev. W. McK. Matthews, Rev. J. S. Bonnell, Rev. A. J. MacNeill, Rev. H. Miller, Rev. G. D. MacLeod, Rev. James Ross, Rev. S. R. Prince, Rev. G. L. Blanchard, Rev. W. N. Byers, Rev. R. H. Scott, Rev. L. A. Knox and Rev. A. Sutherland announced intention to remain with the United Church.

Rev. W. A. MacQuarrie was recommended for the chair of New Testament in Knox College. Rev. W. A. Wood was reappointed to the Norton church for another year and Rev. C. A. Mearle was appointed to the Hampton, Rothesay and Hammond River field as stated supply in the meantime.

The resignation of Rev. W. M. Townsend as co-conventor of the Home Mission Committee was accepted with regret.

MRS. ANNE MASSIE DEAD AT ST. JOHN

Former Fredericton Woman Had Been in Failing Health for Long Time.

St. John, N. B., June 30.—Mrs. Anne S. Massie, widow of the late William Massie, formerly of Fredericton, passed away yesterday afternoon in Miss Craig's Hospital, where she had been for some weeks. She was 71 years of age and had been in failing health for a long time.

Mrs. Massie was born in Aberdeenshire, Scotland, but came to New Brunswick more than 50 years ago, settling in Fredericton, where she and her family lived until about 15 years ago, when she came to St. John.

She is survived by three sons, Lieut.-Col. A. E. Massie, D. S. O. of St. John; Stephen S. Massie, of Boston, Mass.; and George Massie, of Edmonton, Alta.; three daughters, Mrs. Everett C. Dyer, of Portland, Me.; Mrs. William C. Clarke, of St. John; and Mrs. Frank C. Wry, of St. John, and 19 grandchildren.

Mrs. Massie was associated all her life in New Brunswick with the church and temperance activities. She was an active member of St. Paul's Presbyterian church in Fredericton and of St. David's church here. Mrs. Massie made a host of friends throughout the province and her death will be mourned by a great many here and in Fredericton.

Numerous Fredericton friends heard with regret this morning of the death of Mrs. Massie. During her long residence in this city she had many close friends.

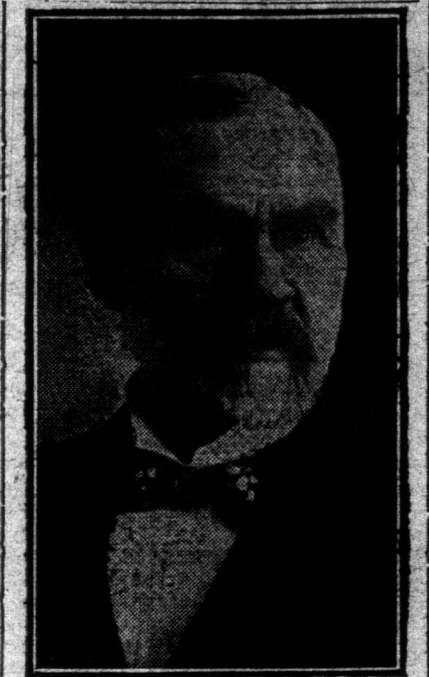

Wick Indians during the past winter of birch bark and shipped across the border into Maine have been seized at Pleasant Point near Eastport, Me.; the Indians were surprised at this interference with what they had come to regard as their rights. Nobody had ever thought of charging Indians duty upon their wares.

However, the now busy United States customs officials swooped down upon the Indians and seized the 3,000 toy canoes which they charged had been smuggled over the border without official entry. This was done to avoid high duty, they boldly charged, and finally after much ado in official circles the 3,000 toy canoes have been declared forfeited.

The Indians were getting the canoes ready to sell to summer tourists at the Maine coast resorts as souvenirs and it is believed they will now try to bid them in at Uncle Sam's auction next week at Eastport.

Canadian Gold Coins Presented.

The cash prizes of \$25 each offered by the Fredericton Branch of the Great War Veterans Association for the boys leading Grade X and Grade IX in the Fredericton High School in the year's work, and awarded yesterday for the first time, when they were won by James A. Trites and Hanford Fowler, were made in Canadian gold from the Dominion mint at Ottawa. Usually gold coins used for presentation purposes here are United States gold coins, but so complete and so appropriate were the preparations made by the Veterans for the presentations that Canadian gold coins were placed in the hands of Colonel H. Montgomery-Campbell, O. B. E., who made the presentations at the graduation exercises at the High School last evening.
