

RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

STRENGTH, N. S., 24 Oct.—A fatal railway accident happened on the night of Friday last. The C. P. R. train which passed at 11 o'clock struck and instantly killed Daniel Mahar, of New Brunswick, a workman in Dickie's mill. Strange to say, several trains passed during the night and no one observed the body, which was found by section men going the road about daylight with one arm and leg cut off and his brains and skull scattered along the sleepers. The body was almost beyond recognition, but was identified by Thos. McNeill, foreman at Mr. Dickie's mill. A jury was empanelled before coroner Muir, of Timon and brought in a verdict according to evidence that produced, that deceased came to his death by being struck by the engine of No. 29 train and his limbs attached to any of the train fixtures. Since then our evidence has cropped out and here are entertained of foul play. Deceased was a married man and leaves a wife and one child who reside at Joggins, Cumberland County, where the remains were forwarded by the Quebec train Sunday afternoon.

DUPED BY A CLAIRVOYANT.

A PENNSYLVANIA WIDOW SCHEMED IN A NEW WAY BY EXERCISED PEOPLE.

WASHINGTON, PENN., Oct. 21.—Mrs. Asa R. Woods, who a few weeks ago fondly fancied that she had come into property to the value of \$250,000, has made the discovery that she is out of pocket and the victim of a bold charlatan. Mrs. Woods is the widow of a newspaper man, and has been credited with being pretty shrewd in business matters. Therefore when she some time ago told her friends that William H. Jasper, of Lewistown, Idaho, who was a winner of her before she married Woods, had given her deeds, cheques and drafts to the amount of \$340,000, it was accepted as a matter of course, and she was held as the richest widow in the country. The truth which has now come out is less romantic. Mrs. Woods had consulted a clairvoyant who began business by inducing the widow to send \$10 to a certain address, in return for which she received \$20. This game was kept up for some time, and then Mrs. Woods was advised that she would come into a fortune. The next step was the appearance of a stranger, who presented himself as the attorney of her old sweetheart Jasper. He handled her the deeds and cheques already referred to, and was shown every attention while in town and then disappeared after borrowing about \$500 and a gold watch from the widow. He took the deeds with him ostensibly to have them recorded. The banks in which the drafts and cheques were placed for collection soon found that they were not worth the paper they were written upon. Worst of all no trace can be had of the swindler.

TERRIBLE EXPERIENCE.

Or Two Sportsmen on a Seaboard Island at Tusket. YARMOUTH, October 23.—L. B. Wyman and Norman Wyman had a most thrilling experience yesterday morning while gunning among the Tusket islands. They went down with some others in the steamer "Iris" on Saturday night to Gull Island. At 4 o'clock Thursday morning they were put on a place called "Scribe Reef" while two others of the party went to another island. When they had been on for some hours they noticed the tide had risen beyond the high water mark and they began to climb up on it and found a solitary raft driven up by the tide and tamed by fright, was with them. The water continued to rise, and soon their pillar was submerged and the waves were up to their waists, while in every direction the white-capped breakers surrounded them. The outlook was gloomy, and it still wanted an hour of high tide. Fortunately the tug came back much sooner than was expected. When it got in sight of the island the boat was sailing but breakers crowded on all steam, till they found the two men standing in the water and their dogs swimming about them. A little dory was launched and Samuel Weare and Arthur Caldwell essayed to rescue the drowning men. Again and again they were beaten off by the waves, but finally one of the men in the water managed to catch the boat and they were taken aboard and with much difficulty got to the steamer. They had a closer call than most men have who lived to tell of it.

THE RUSSIAN FAMINE.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 22.—The famine has extended to Siberia. The governor has compiled a report showing that in the district of Koltobotowah and Patrapatowah what food supplies the inhabitants possessed have been entirely exhausted, and appeals to public charity. Owing to the difficulty of transportation in winter efforts at relief seem almost hopeless. Supplies from Caucasasia are improving in quantity and it is hoped they will avail to stave off the worst effects of the famine. Advice from the interior of the empire are continually of worse import. The people are commencing to riot in Samara and Veronez. Reports from the provinces of Sibirak and Samara show that the local Government is unable to cope with the prevailing distress and that relief has

CHINESE AFFAIRS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22.—Shanghai advices state that details have been received of a revolution in the province of Fukir. The centre of the disturbance is in the City of Thins, the leader of the insurgents is named Chen and he has a force of 3,000 men. The first expedition was directed against the salt office, which was stormed and burned. One unfortunate fell into the hands of the insurgents, who mangled his hands and feet to a hard and cut him up by piecemeal. The insurgents, flushed with success, made a complete circuit around the city. They were met with a stubborn resistance. For three days the city held out. The insurgents finally scaled the walls, when a bloody struggle ensued, resulting in favor of the attacking party. The higher authorities, on learning of the insurrection, despatched over 1,000 soldiers to the place. The latest intelligence is that the insurgents have left the city and are encamped on a hill. The loss on both sides is very heavy. It is said the insurgents butchered all the prisoners who fell into their hands.
