### LAWYER WON THIS CASE.

Mr. McClemont Sustained by the Courts This Morning.

The Outcome of a Bitter Dispute Between Two Neighbors.

Justice Latchford Comments on Howell vs. Patterson.

At the Assizes yesterday His Lordship Justice Latchford, heard the action of William Howell, of Ancaster, against George R. Patterson, of Jerseyville. The statement of claim alleged that under a lease of agreement the defendant, Patterson, took possession of a farm of 143 acres of the plaintiff, and agreed to pay \$400 a year. The lease was dated April 1st, 1907. The defendant occupied the farm until April 1st, 1908, when he terminated the lease. The plaintiff claimed \$500 for unpaid rent, etc. The defendant claimed that it was understood that the house on the farm was to be shingled and sided, and other work done in the nature of improvements, which were not done. The defendant also put in a ccunter claim for damages and for services rendered. S. C. Biggs, Toronto, appeared for the plaintiff and W. M. Mc-Clemont for the defendant.

In reserving judgment until this morning, His Lordship had a few remarks to make about people who are not qualified to draw up deeds and other legal instruments. He said that from the evidence in this case there was no doubt that "it was the outcome of cheap conveyancing, by men who do not know their business." The lease or agreement which had been drawn up was full of errors and inconsistencies. The conveyancing was not done by either of the lawyers in the case.

His Lordship directed that the costs on the High Court scale be granted, the defendant and County Court costs to the plaintiff, G. L. Staunton appeared for the plaintiff and J. L. In consequence of this Harper entered a suit in the county court against Brown, and obtained an injunction and later was given a judgment by the court for \$249 against Brown.
