Resolved That this Meeting would express its unqualified approval of the dignified course taken by the Legislature of this Colony in the present emergency, and would urgently implore them to resist to the utmost any aggression on our Constitutional rights, and to adopt such measures by deputation or otherwise, as may seem to them best adapted to subserve the momentous interests involved in the measures in question.

Moved by Mr. Claudias Watts, seconded by Mr. John Byrne.

Resolved—That a Committee be appointed to draw up Petitions to the Queen and both Houses of Parliament embracing the views of this meeting and obtain the signatures of the whole population thereto

Thus far then our fellow Citizens have done their duty, but more remains to be done, soon as the Petitions are prepared for signature, let the name of every man who has the interest of the Country at heart be attached thereto, and in remote places, the names should be taken down and forwarded to the Chairman or Secretary, so that no man may hereafter have to charge himself with negligence in a matter of such paramount importance to his country, to his family, and to posterity.

From our position, it may be expected that we hazard an opinion upon the matter in question. We will do so: If the Inhabitants of Newfoundland generally unite and appeal with one voice to the Imperial Government, the subject will be promptly taken up by the friends of the Country elsewhere, and the first Minister of the day, will find it difficult to retain his position, if a course so Anti-British in its character, and so fraught with evil in its consequences, as the one contemplated, be persisted in.

Sir On Thursday last 100 friends (as many as the upper school room, of the Wesleyan Church, could accommodate), sat down to a plentiful repast, which was not without delicacies, gratuitously provided by a few Ladies, of the congregation and enjoyed together a very happy evening; the room was adorned with flags, very tastefully; amongst which the meteor flag of Old England, had the most honourable position.

After tea the attention of the friends was called to the need of a new enclosure for the spacious and pleasantly situated Cemetery of our Church, and Congregation; when it was immediately and unanimously resolved to commence a subscription for the above mentioned purpose; which together with the price paid for admission to the meeting, amounts to nearly £50. A pleasing feature of the meeting, was the information afforded that a large number of persons, whose ancestor's mortal remains repose in the graveyard: have resolved to have at the fitting period a general turn out; and gratuitously bring the stone to the spot, for the required purpose. On the following evening 230 children partook of the hospitality of the same Ladies, in the same place; and being joined by some friends after tea, who filled the room, the lobby, and passage, joined ere they separated, in singing the National Anthem, and then heartily joined in well sustained cheers for our Most Gracious Queen.
