### HYDRO-ELECTRIC POWER

The matter of obtaining Hydro Electric Power for the Town of Newcastle has at last been accomplished. This will mean a big thing for the town and surrounding districts. For the past number of years our present Electric Light Plant has been depreciating in value very fast and has also been costing our town a large amount of money both in operating expenses and in piling up deficits year after year. Last fall a Newcastle Commercial Club was formed, and one of the first matters which the Club took up was the procuring of a satisfactory electric service. A committee was appointed by the Club to take this matter up with the Government and the Hydro-Electric Commission of the Province. This committee has worked faithfully and from time to time made their reports of progress to the Club. A large amount of time and energy on the part of the committee members was spent with the result that Hydro-Electric Power for the Town of Newcastle will be a certainty within the next three months. When the Commercial Club had matters to the point where business could be definitely settled, the Town Council was advised, and that body has now entered into an agreement with the Hydro-Electric Commission, whereby Power in an unlimited quantity will be supplied to the Town for lighting and power purposes. The Hydro-Electric Commission have already called for tenders for the cutting of the right of way and the construction of the transmission line, and work will be started at once.

The Commercial Club, while only being in existence for a few months, have accomplished a most beneficial service to our Town, and the members of the Club are deserving of the heartiest congratulations from the citizens. Our town is now in a position (through the engeries of the Commercial Club) to seek industries, (which are badly needed) and we as a community are now in a much better position to induce people to come

to our town and open up places for manufacturing. We are given to understand that it is the intention of the Club to follow up their good work and we have no doubt but that in the near future they will have something else to acquaint the public, which will also be of great importance and worth to the community.

The Commercial Club is deserving of the hearty co-operation of all our citizens, as they are doing excellent work gratuitously for the community at large, and if given the co-operation of all, the good work which has now been commenced will continue to flourish in a much greater degree in the future. Let every one help the good work along.

## DEMPSEY RETAINS CHAMPION TITLE

New York, July 3.—Jack Dempsey is still heavyweight pugilist champion of the world. A crushing right swing from his fist shattered the aspirations of George Carpentier in the fourth round of the so-called battle of the century here yesterday afternoon. The pile-driving blow landed flush upon the jaw of the Frenchman, flooring Carpentier for the second time in a trifle more than a minute of fighting in the final and decisive round.

Although he had staggered to his feet after the initial knockdown he was unable to survive the second knockdown and was motionless when referee Harry Ertle tolled off the fatal ten counts.

## GETTING WELL MORE DANGEROUS

(Dr. Huber in Montreal Star)

In every acute germ disease, from grippe to diphtheria, poisons are spread all through the body. They get into the blood stream and, until they are eliminated, have a constant depressing and paralyzing effect on the muscular tissue of the heart. So the convalescence is often more dangerous than acute illness.

When a patient is unmistakably ill, he has a healthy respect for the doctor's orders, and consequently lies quiet and puts little strain on his heart. When he feels better and his fever is gone, then the doctor's cautions seem unnecessary and absurd. He gets up before he should, tries to work or play, and sometimes he gets well anyway—for the heart is a brave, sturdy organ, and even when weakened by its fight with poison, tries to go on with its work of building up decayed tissues. But sometimes he doesn't get well.

The doctors told the parents of a child just recovering from diphtheria, that it should remain in bed and be kept quiet. The parents, seeing that the child was doing well, put it on the nursery floor and let it play with toys as long as it liked. Almost without warning the child died.

A man who had fairly recovered from pneumonia was cautioned to lie quietly in bed until, under the influence of rest and an extra-nutritious diet, he should become stronger. The patient was finding that sort of thing irksome, so he sat up in bed and played cards with his wife—until suddenly he fell back dead.

A gripe convalescent, an elderly gentleman, testily observed "Such a fussy lot, these doctors. Keep making their calls, running up their bills, giving you advice after you are well. My doctor tells me I ought, at least to stay indoors. Bosh! Besides, an old horse that once lies down never gets up." So he put on his coat and went to a directors' meeting, from which he returned that afternoon in a collapse. He died next day.

The above list of examples is enough to show the danger of taking the law of health into one's hands. Doctors realize well, although the patient and his family so often do not, the meaning of the danger signals—the continuing though slight fever, the weak and uncertain pulse, the in shortness of breath after a small ex-
