The objective of the Canadian Jewish Relief Fund Campaign was reached yesterday. At three minutes to one o'clock the hand of the indicator outside the headquarters on King street, Toronto, was shoved up to the \$200,000 mark.

The fate in the Commons of certain measures introduced in the Senate is in doubt. Senator Lynch-Staunton is the father of a measure to compel dealers in German and Austrian goods to advertise the fact. The bill stands for third reading. That it will pass is fully anticipated, therefore it must come to the Commons for consideration.

A daring robbery was discovered in Niagara Falls, N.Y., at Amberg's, a big department store, goods amounting to \$800 being stolen through an opening today. It is claimed that an automobile was used and the thieves were evidently familiar with the lay-out of the store, for only the best grades of goods were stolen. The loot was made up chiefly of Men's suits, shirts, ties, etc. Of shirts nothing but silk shirts were taken.

Senator Ross of Middleton, has succeeded in piloting through the Upper Chamber his two bills of divorce, whose purpose it is to provide in Ontario and Prince Edward Island for the dissolution and annulment of marriage through the courts, as in other Provinces but Quebec. There is reason to believe that the Government is favorable to the measures put forward by Senator Ross, who is very close to the Government leader in the Upper Chamber, and that the bills will have the Government sanction and support.

Representatives of the Retail Merchants' Association and the Fruit Growers' Association of Toronto attended yesterday's session of the Legislature when J. W. Curry's bill depriving Municipalities of the right to pass early closing by-laws, except when properly petitioned for, by the electorate was considered. By 24 to 5 the committee decided that all by-laws passed under a sub-section of the Factory, Shop and Office Building Act shall cease to be effective on and after April 30, 1920, in so far as they apply to the sale of fruit.

Hon. Nelson Parliament's refusal to recognize whether H. H. Dewar or Hon. C. H. Ferguson is Opposition leader in the Legislature is likely to result in a saving to the Province of \$3,000 a year. While it is understood that Premier Drury and other members of the Government are not entirely satisfied with the decision of the Speaker the fact remains that the \$5,000 salary cannot be paid to anyone as the statute now stands. A compromise is likely to be reached, however, by which the leaders' salary will be allowed to lapse and the Government will undertake to pay the salaries of two secretaries, one for each of the two leaders.

Parisians Now Keep Snakes as Pets; Toads, Too

PARIS, April 24—"Seeing snakes" will be a regular daily experience of husbands in Paris if the newest craze of fashionable women here gains popularity.

A stylishly attired woman, taking tea at the Claridge yesterday afternoon, suddenly opened her handbag and carelessly unloosed a slender green and gold snake, about two feet long, which wriggled to the floor and disappeared up the trouser-leg of a terrified waiter who fainted on the spot.

Rushing to the waiter, the woman calmly extracted the pet, replaced it in her handbag, and swept indignantly out of the restaurant. Afterward she complained to the manager that her favorite reptile was indisposed as the result of having bitten a plebeian waiter.

The manager requested her to move explaining that while he had kennels and cat houses, and bird cages, and even an aquarium for his guest's pets he had neglected to provide a suitable home for snakes.

Today, however, he discovered that no fewer than five women in the hotel own reptile "pets" and refuse to part with the "little darlings" which they maintain as "perfectly harmless."

The snakes were obtained by their present owners from Mme. Phisalix wife of the inventor of the anti-snake bite serum, who is now ill as a result of her refusal to counteract a snake bite because she wanted to make a scientific experiment.

ROCHESTER, April 24—After deliberating for eleven hours and fifty minutes a supreme court jury at 10:25 o'clock last night brought in a verdict of murder in the first degree against James L. Odell, indicted with his wife, Pearl Beaver Odell, for the murder of Edward J. Kueip on the night of January 7. Immediately after the verdict was announced Odell was sentenced by Justice Robert Thompson to die in the week of June 13.

Weighed down by the nervous strain of the trial and her own heroic efforts to save the life of her husband through a sacrifice of her own honor, Mrs. Odell suffered a complete relapse at the Monroe County Jail this morning shortly before the hour set for the opening of the final session of court. A mere slip of a girl physically, her superb carriage through the trying ordeal of the last three days was purely on the strength of her supreme endeavor to do her utmost for the man she loves.

Although the outcome of the present case may have considerable bearing on the trial of Mrs. Odell due to be called for the latter part of May, it is believed that the defense in her case will take such course as will give it a decidedly independent aspect, or present condition is such that an important event is expected before the calling of her case next month, which is expected to have an important bearing on the jury's attitude toward her. In the testimony which she gave in the trial of her husband, she did not go into the details of the actual killing of Kueip, her lawyer asserting his legal right to prevent his client from incriminating herself.

On Monday C. J. Coppen, convicted by Mr. Justice Latchford and a jury of the murder of his wife in North Toronto last fall, will learn his fate. Coppen is under sentence to hang on May 5, and on Monday the First Divisional Court will give judgement on his stated case. Coppen will either hang or will be given a new trial.
