Rigid Laws of War.

Both the United States and Mexico are signatory powers to the "convention with respect to the laws and customs of war on land," adopted at The Hague in 1899, and therefore are bound by its humane proclamations. This convention promulgated a formidable series of rules. The most important restriction which it imposes upon those engaged in war are to prohibit absolutely the following

To employ poison or poisoned arms. To kill or wound treacherously individuals belonging to the hostile na-

To kill or wound an enemy who, having laid down arms, or having no longer means of defence, has surrendered at discretion.

To declare that no quarter will be

To employ arms, projectiles or material of a nature to cause superfluous injury. To make improper use of a flag of

truce, the national flag or military ensigns and the enemy's uniform, as well as the distinctive badges of Geneva (red cross) convention.

To destroy or seize the enemy's property unless such destruction or seizure be imperatively demanded by the necessities of war

To attack or bombard towns, villages, habitations or buildings which are not defended.

To pillage a town or place even when taken by assault.

To punish a spy, without trial even if taken in the act; and a spy which he belongs, is subsequently captured by the enemy must be treated as a prisoner of war and incurs no responsibility for his previous acts or

To compel the population of occupied territory to take part in military operations against its own coun-

To bring pressure upon the population of occupied territory to take the oath to the hostile power. To confiscate private property.

All of these specific prohibitions are based on the declaration that the right of beligerents to adopt means of injuring the enemy is not unlmitted." Special provisions are made to compel the humane treatment of prisoners. It is also provided that advance warning must be given, wherever possible, to the peaceful inhabitants of a town before bonbardment is begun. In seizure and bombardment it is also commanded that all necessary steps should be taken to spare as far as possible edifices devoted to religion, art, science and charity, hospitals and places where the sick and wounded are collected, provided they are not used at the same time for military purposes." It is further stipulated that "family honors and rights, individual lives and private property as well as religious convictions and liberty, must
