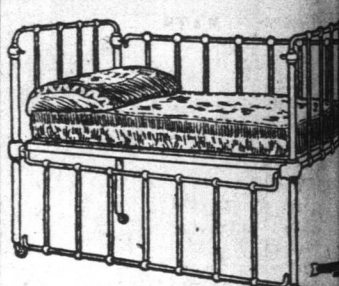

Sale of Liquor

Suggested.

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—A temporary

relaxation of the prohibition regula-

tion to allow liquor to be purchased

in small quantities without the pro-

duction of a doctor's prescription has

been suggested to the government as an

emergency requirement of the Spanish

influenza epidemic now raging

throughout Canada. The proposal is

being seriously advocated in some

quarters but as yet has not been

either approved or turned down by

the cabinet.

The reason used for a temporary

and restricted lifting of the present

barriers against the distribution of

liquor in Canada is that the serious-

ness of the influenza epidemic de-

mands it. It is claimed that hot

liquor taken in small quantities is

beneficial either as a preventative or

as a stimulant to prevent vertigo or

collapse through the sudden onslaught

and rapid progress of the disease. In

Ottawa, doctors are said to be pre-

scribing liquor to victims of the dis-

ease, in the pneumonia stage. To-

day there were hundreds of people

with doctor's prescriptions for liquor

crowding the local dispensary in

Sparkes street. So great was the

crush this afternoon that traffic along

the sidewalk was blocked by the

crowd waiting a chance to get into

the store to be served.

Ottawa has some four thousand

cases of influenza at present and the

call for liquor by doctors and patients

has suddenly assumed proportions

which can't be handled by the present

circumscribed sources of supply. It

is further pointed out that the poorer

classes who need or think they need

an emergency supply of liquor to meet

the "plague" situation are now com-

pelled to pay an extra two dollars for

a doctor's prescription, and that under

present conditions of stress for the

medical men a search for a doctor

sometimes takes hours.

It is not proposed, of course, to al-

low the sale of liquor indiscriminate-

ly but merely to allow the qualified

local dispensaries to sell a small

quantity of five or six ounces only to

the applicant with each sale duly re-

gistered so as to prevent "repeaters."

The proposed relaxation is, of course,

only intended for a week or so pend-

ing the hoped for control and stamp-

ing out of the epidemic. It is claimed

that under the War Measures act the

federal government would have the

right to override the provincial pro-

hibition regulations in a case where

the national safety is concerned.
