The Prince's Triumph.

The Prince of Wales's Canadian visit has been successful beyond even the confident anticipations which went with him when he left this country; and to say this is no courtier's compliment, but a deliberate verdict upon evidence, overwhelming in its unanimity, that has come from every part of the Dominion. It has been, too, eminently a personal success. The Prince, in Newfoundland and throughout Canada, has borne himself with that frank unreserve, that ready sympathy, that modesty, and that unforced humour which set the standards by which men's judgment of their fellow-men is framed. It goes without saying that he has not relied upon his birth, his rank, or his prospects; but no mere negative of personal bearing could have given him the welcome from the whole people of the Dominion that has been his. Canada is a keen judge of a man, and by no means prejudiced in favour of an Englishman, even though he be a Prince. Polite to the Prince of Wales, and prodigal of formal welcome, the Canadian people would have been in any case. But the Prince's achievement has been to turn politeness into enthusiasm, to break the ice of formality, and to appeal to the human warmth of feeling in those who have gathered to meet him. It is no easy thing that he has done, and he has done it with a conquering ease that has been triumphant testimony to the force of his personality.

But much more than the prestige of a personal success goes with the Prince of Wales to the United States. His visit to Canada may well be a landmark in Empire history. Canada came to the days of peace with a new pride among the nations, won on the battlefields of Europe. How great a change that is for the Dominion, what its consequences promise to be in their bearing upon the relations of the component States of the Empire, and of the nations of the earth, few in these islands, with their traditional sluggishness of imaginative insight, yet realize. But nothing is more certain than that Canada is destined to achieve in the near future a remarkable growth—in internal prosperity, in population, in wealth, in prestige; that she will not be content to abandon the international position which her Prime Minister, Sir Robert Borden, held on her behalf at the Peace Congress; and that these changes must involve a root-and-branch revision of her power and influence within the Empire. These effects of Canada's war achievement the Prince of Wales has learnt to appreciate at their full value; so that Canada, which is apt at times to resent the slowness of the British Isles in understanding them, will feel for years to come that she has in him an enthusiastic and a most effectual champion, within the wide limits of his constitutional sphere. He goes to the United States in a different, but still a most influential capacity, as the representative of the British Empire, who returns the visit that President Wilson made to this country. No individual more fitly than the Prince can express in person to the President the sympathy of the British peoples in the illness which has stricken him down, and the warmth of good feeling between the English-speaking peoples may well burst the bonds of State formality in the welcome that he receives.—The Times.

THE PRINCE OF WALES FIFTY YEARS AGO.

Turn back the scroll of time just fifty years, as the Prince of Wales, who has amazingly won the hearts of Canada, and the United States, leaves our Atlantic shores, see what the Prince of Wales, his grandfather, was doing then.

Here is a paragraph from the newspapers of November, 1869:

"The Prince of Wales arrived in Scarborough on Monday evening. The decorations of the town appear to have been in very good taste, and the welcome given to His Royal Highness most enthusiastic. The Prince's reply to the addresses presented to him by the Corporation expressed the gratification he had experienced from his former visits to the manufacturing towns of Yorkshire, and complimented Scarborough on its natural beauties and its salubrity. Yesterday morning, the Prince, in a four-in-hand, driven by Lord Londesborough, passed through the town on his way to shoot on the Seamer estate of his noble host. In the evening His Royal Highness was present at a concert in the Spa Saloon, at which the famous vocalist, Mdlle. Nilsson was the principal singer. On Wednesday evening His Royal Highness, with a very distinguished party, visited Messrs. Henry and Adams's circus, when the house was crowded in every part by a most respectable audience, who gave the Prince a very enthusiastic reception. The performances were of a more than ordinarily interesting character, and were frequently applauded, the Prince being one of the most enthusiastic in his expressions of approbation."

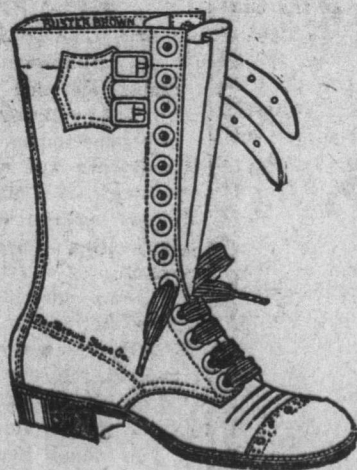
