Big Welcome for Lord Byng.

IMPRESSIVE SERVICES WILL WITNESS THE ADMINISTRATION OF OATH.

Ottawa, July 2.—(By Canadian Press, Ottawa Bureau.)—Once every five years the people of Canada bid an affectionate farewell to a governor-general, and with a great warm-heartedness immediately welcome the incoming representative of His Majesty the King. In that welcome there is much of form and ceremony, curiosity and red tape, but under it all there lies a tremendous desire to assure the new governor-general that he is right welcome. Perhaps history will never record a more determined attempt to make a governor-general feel "at home" than the welcome that will be extended to Baron Byng of Vimy, soldier and statesman and the popular and honored leader of the Canadian Corps in France and Flanders.

The ships bearing His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire to England and Lord Byng to Canada will, as is usual, pass in mid ocean. With the arrival of Lord Byng at the port of debarkation—either Halifax or Quebec—the serious business of installing the new governor-general will commence. The docks will be lined with troops, flags will fly, guns from the harbor forts will thunder forth their salute. It is not a simple ceremony. It is governed by the rules of procedure and the table of precedence.

Leaving the boat the Governor-General will be taken to the provincial legislative chamber where he will be "sworn in," sign the Oath Book, issue his proclamation, bidding the government continue to function, after which he will board a special train for Ottawa to be again welcomed and cheered before proceeding to Government House.

It has been customary in the past for members of the government and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court to meet the Governor-General at the dock and to escort him in state to the legislative chamber. In the chamber the Governor-General will take his seat upon a dias with government members and representatives of the army and navy standing at the right and left. Guests stand below the table of the assembly house. They will be there because their names appear on the table of precedence. It is a curious fact that only the unmarried daughters of those on this table are invited. The invitations are issued in the name of "His Majesty's Canadian Government."

The table of precedence includes the names of senators and members of the House of Commons and legislative assemblies and the civil officials of the debarkation port. In addition to this, men prominent in business and in public life are also invited, with their wives and unmarried daughters.

When Baron Byng has taken his seat the clerk of the Privy Council, Rodolphe Boudreau, will take up the Bible and, bowing to the Governor-General, will hand it to Sir Louis Davies, chief justice of the Supreme Court of Canada and deputy governor general. On Sir Louis receiving the Bible Baron Byng will step down from the dias and will take the Bible from the chief justice and will duly repeat the oath. Now, the oath is really divided into three sections and in them the governor-general affirms that he will bear true allegiance to the King, administer Canadian affairs impartially and execute the office of Keeper of the Seals.

The oaths to be taken by Baron Byng follow: Baron Byng of Vimy, etc., do swear that I will be faithful and true and bear true allegiance to His Majesty the King, His Heirs and ancestors according to law. So help me God.

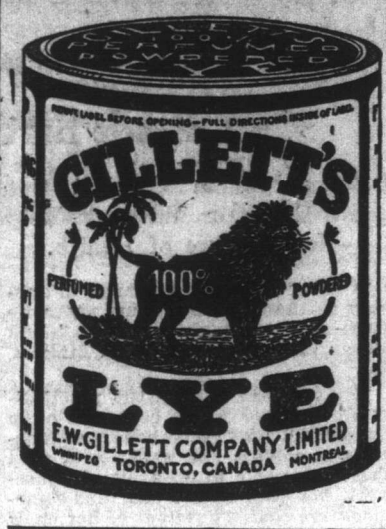
The second oath, read by Chief Justice Sir Louis Davies: "You shall well and truly exercise the office and trust of Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief of the Dominion of Canada and truly and impartially administer justice therein."

The third oath relates to the Great Seal: "You shall well and truly execute the office of Keeper of the Great Seal of His Majesty's Dominion of Canada according to the best of your knowledge and ability."

All three oaths are recorded in the Oath Book, a large formal looking volume bound in red leather, and are witnessed by the Chief Justice and Mr. Boudreau.

Sir Louis Davies is sworn in as deputy governor and he in turn affirms that when called upon he will do all the things which the governor-general is supposed to do.

At this period the Clerk of the Privy Council will place the Oath Book and official papers at the head of the table for signing and the governor-general will read his proclamation. This document is replete with old-fashioned phrases and sonorous periods, and sets forth that His Majesty the King has been graciously pleased to appoint Baron Byng to the office of governor-general of Canada and that, having



been appointed, it is the wish of the governor-general that all public servants and the people generally should continue to work as before. The document and the other papers are signed by Lord Byng and his private seal.

Following this ceremony the Secretary of State will approach the dais bearing the Great Seal of the Dominion of Canada and will present it to Lord Byng, who will promptly hand it back saying: "I hand you the Great Seal for safe-keeping." The ceremony will be brought to a conclusion by the band playing the first six bars of God Save the King.

During the whole ceremony guards of honour will stand outside the building and as in the past the streets will be lined with soldiers. This latter part of the ceremony serves the double purpose of doing honor to Baron Byng and keeping the curious along the route from jamming the roadways. A salute of 19 guns will also be fired.

Following the installation it has been customary for the mayor and civic officials of either Halifax or Quebec to tender the incoming governor-general a welcome reception. This function is attended by those on the table of precedence and by such others as the municipality sees fit to invite.

Immediately after the ceremonies, both national and civic, Baron Byng will be escorted to his private train and will proceed to the Capital. It is fair to say that at the port of debarkation, along the route and in Ottawa he and Lady Byng will be showered with good wishes and bouquets of flowers. At Ottawa it is probable that the tracks on which the train will come in will be covered with a canopy while a guard of honor from the Governor-General's Foot Guards will meet the train in addition to government and civic officials. The Capital, itself, will be in fête. Flags will be flown, bunting displayed and thousands of citizens will jam the thoroughfares to catch a glimpse of His Excellency.

The special train on which Baron Byng will travel will undoubtedly be worthy of notice. In the past railway officials have "sat up nights" making sure that no hitch would occur. That they have been successful is testified to by letters of appreciation which several leading Canadian railwaymen have hanging in their offices. The train from the seaport to Ottawa will be preceded by a pilot engine and every possible care will be taken to see that the journey is accomplished in complete safety and comfort. One of the odd features of this journey is that the trainmen connected with it are solemnly and duly paid \$5.00 as a gratuity.

In Ottawa formal greetings will be extended by the Prime Minister, Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen and by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the opposition. It is also likely that a state dinner, probably at the Country Club, will be included in the welcoming ceremonies. While Baron Byng is not expected to come to Canada for some weeks, yet the officials of the Department of State are already scanning old files, brushing upon procedure and in fact laying the ground work for one of the most important ceremonies in the history of Canada.

Bricklayers and Masons Protest.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir.—As a result of a number of members of the Bricklayers' and Masons' Union being forced to quit work to uphold the principles for which their Union was established, and fearing that certain misrepresentations may have an injurious effect on members of the Bricklayers' and Masons' Union generally, it was decided at a meeting held last night to give publicity to the facts and let the public judge accordingly, and further that the said publicity may be the means of getting the Government busy with a view to protecting those of us whose rights and privileges as workmen in our native land are very often set aside for the benefit of foreigners.

Well, Sir, as you are aware the Royal Bank of Canada has in course of construction a Bank building which is now near completion, the contract of which was given to the Dickie Construction Company (of course a foreign company), which in itself is a gross injustice to local contractors. They, however, saw fit to employ local labor which possibly was advantageous to them, as we claim our workmen gave entire satisfaction, the proof of which can be seen by a visit to the Royal Bank of Canada Building.

Even though this is a fact, and capable workmen of different crafts required to complete the building could be obtained in the city, the Dickie Construction Company would rather go into Canada for Plasterers than employ local workmen. This action is a gross outrage, considering the most trying times we are going through, and the scarcity of work in the city, and further that the money obtained for the placing of that Bank Building was made in this country as a result of the sweat and toil of the common people.

They were not satisfied with bringing Plasterers to take the work of our local Plasterers, but they went further and permitted them to take the outside cement coating of the brickwork which was an infringement on the rules of the Bricklayers' and Masons' Union, and as a result thereof the members of our Union were forced out, owing to not being permitted by rule to work with non-members, and this they were allowed to do by the Dickie Construction Co., after having given them their best to make a name for said company by the splendid workmanship to be seen at the said building, which to say the least is poor appreciation for capable and faithful service.

How long, Mr. Editor, is this going to be permitted to go on? How long is the Government going to permit foreigners to take the bread and butter from our mouths, without making a move in our behalf? We think, Sir, it is time some sort of taxation should be placed on foreign companies operating in the country, so that we may be afforded an opportunity of obtaining that which is legally ours. The Bricklayers' and Masons' Union wishes to place itself on record as condemning the action of the Dickie Construction Company, in this connection, and earnestly request the Government now in session to legislate in some way for the protection of local against foreign labor.
