DOMINION CADET FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP.

This is only two of the many on this coast that is put to such inconvenience. It is as bad as ever, with only getting two mails a winter. The people wouldn't mind that if they could get their mails regular in the summer, supposing it was only once a month. It is from fifteen to twenty miles to go to meet the Prospero from these places, and at this time of the year not every day will wind and sea blow. I think it is about time for something to be done before it is ever too late.

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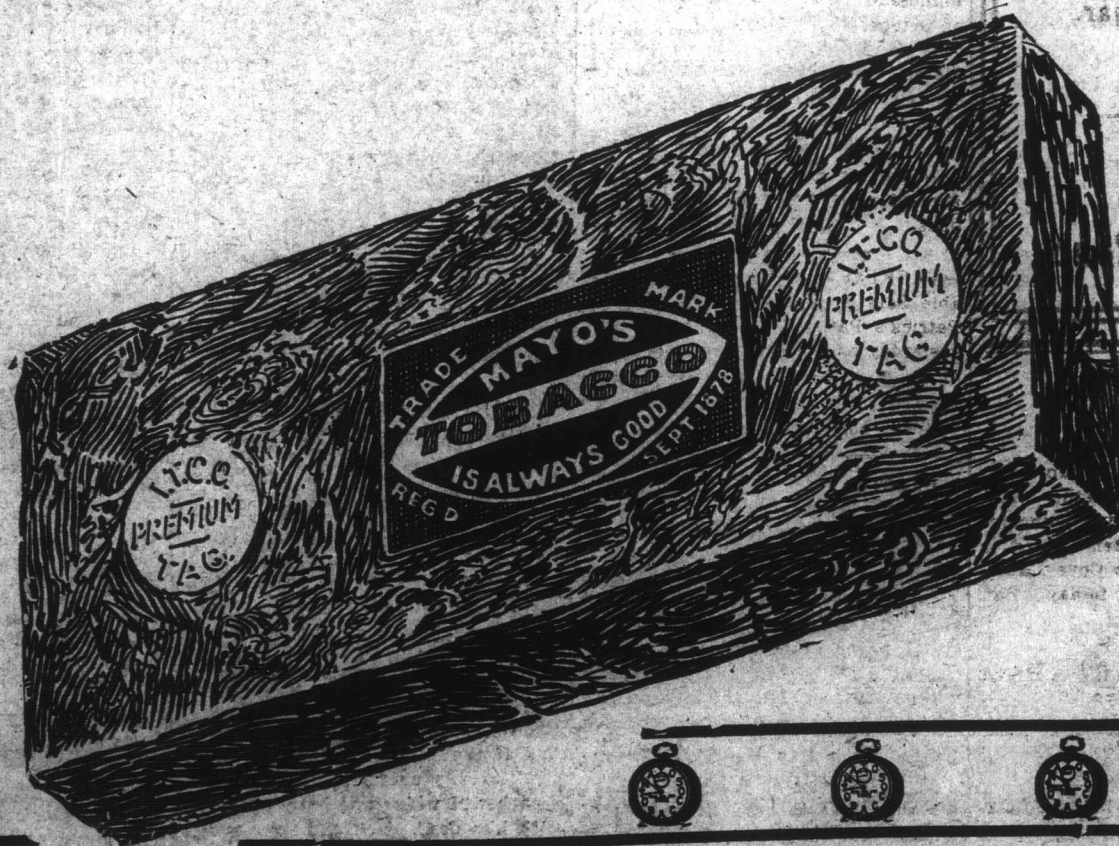
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Church Union Suggested

CANADIAN SYNOD ENDORSES LAMBETH AFFAIR.

HAMILTON, Ont., Oct. 6.—Disclosure of the attitude of the Bishops on the Church union question marked the second day's proceedings of the ninth session of the General Synod of the Church of England in Canada. In a series of resolutions adopted by the Upper House and sent down to the Lower House for its concurrence, the Archbishops and Bishops endorsed the "appeal to all Christian people" issued by the Lambeth Conference, accepted the recommendation that conferences be arranged with other Protestant Churches and declared that such conferences should be initiated in Canada by a special joint committee to be appointed by the General Synod. The condition on which the Bishops would recommend such conferences

were practically identical with those laid down by the Lambeth Conference.

The third resolution outlined the conditions on which the Bishops would agree to such conferences. They state that they "cannot approve of general schemes of inter-union or exchange of pulpits," nor of the celebration in Anglican churches of the Holy Communion, or members of the Anglican Church, by ministers who have not been Episcopally ordained.

The resolution quotes the Lambeth appeal, which declares that the visible unity of the church will be found to involve the whole-hearted acceptance of the Holy Scriptures, the Nicene or Apostles Creed and Sacraments of Baptism and the Holy Communion; a ministry acknowledged by every part of the church as possessing not only the inward call of the spirit, but also the communion of Christ and the authority of the whole body.

The fourth resolution declares that

during the few years between the initiation and completion of a definite scheme of union, the Canadian Bishops would countenance irregularity of admission to communion if baptised by unconfirmed communicants of the non-Episcopalian congregations participating in negotiations.

Again Proposed.

CANADIAN SYNOD INDULGE IN HOT DISCUSSION.

HAMILTON, Ont., Oct. 6.—Discovering that there was anything but unanimity in the minds of the members of the Church of England Synod as to the most desirable name for the church, the Lower House this afternoon was forced to defer action on proposals made by the committee on the name of the church and referred

the matter back for further recommendation.

The report as submitted by Archdeacon Vroom, D.D., of Windsor, N.S., suggested that the matter be left to a ballot of diocesan synods, the choice to lie between three alternatives, the Anglican Church, the Anglican Church in Canada, and the Anglican Church of Canada. The Archdeacon pointed out that as there was considerable divergence of opinion in the church membership, such was the only equitable method of settlement that could be adopted.

"We ourselves in Synod assembled should take the bull by the horns and settle the matter ourselves," declared D. M. Owen, of Halifax. He moved that the name be changed from the Church of England in the Dominion of Canada, to the Church of England in Canada. Canon F. G. Scott, of Quebec, seconded.

That started a succession of protests

from different camps. Captain W. A. Mellish, of Vancouver, was the first to object.

Such a name-connected the presence of a "foreign" church in Canada. The use of the word "English" had long been a source of concern to those who were of Irish or Scotch extraction. The church might with equal propriety call itself the Scottish Episcopal Church in Canada. The name British-Canadian would be imperial in its significance and local in its application.

Other names kept springing up like mushrooms till finally Principal R. Vance, of Vancouver, seconded by Dr. Hastings Lewis, of Montreal, moved that no action be taken and that the matter be referred back to the committee. His motion was adopted.

In spite of determined opposition of a small section of the Synod, the Lower House confirmed the adoption of the new prayer book approved by the General Synod of 1914 and amended

by the 1919 Synod. It now becomes the official manual of the church.

Champions Defeated

Cadets Win Higgins Football Cup.

New. The Brigade go Down to Feet to Bell Island. Cadets in the Snappy Exhibition.

By a score of 2-1, the Bell Island Cadets landed the Higgins' Football Cup on Tuesday afternoon, as they defeated the Dominion Fire Brigade, this year's Champions, before a large gathering of fans on the field of Mr. J. J. Churchill, Ontario, Referee of the Nfld. Football League officiated in a most capable manner. This game, the finale to a most interesting season of sports on Bell Island, was eagerly awaited by the considerable rivalry existed, and the last year's Champions, though capped by the loss of two of their players, St. Carbone and F. McElroy, through injuries—the latter Captain of their team—were determined to gain their laurels. The play-off was a fairly strong one, but the Cadets, who had the advantage of their supporters. The Cadets played hard to equalize, but their efforts were in vain, as the teams crossed over 100 in favour of the fire brigade. On resuming, the Cadets assumed an aggressive, and W. Connors from a neat shot from the right wing, landed the equalizer. This was followed by another rush by the Cadets, when Bob Dwyer landed the goal, and passed Ryan, scoring for the Brigade boys. The Brigade made a determined effort to equalize, but notwithstanding the efforts in their favour, the Cadets defence was too strong, and the final whistle left the Cadets victors by 2-1. This was the eighth clash between the teams this year in a variety of football games, the Cadets winning six, the one and losing one. The line-up of the Cadet team was—Mr. Farrell, Gus Connors (Captain), Jas. Murphy, backs; J. L. Connors, E. Farrell, Dulanthy, halves; P. T. Murphy, Stone, M. Dobbin, B. Dwyer, W. Connors, forwards, while Capt. J. J. Greene, O.C. "C" Co., was Manager of the team during the season. The Brigade line-up was:—R. Ryan, E. Golden, P. Whalen, backs; J. Butler, H. Hamer, S. Norem, halves; White, Leo Kennedy, "Rocky" Walsh, D. Rose, J. Kavanagh, forwards. It concluded a most interesting season for the beautiful Cup kindly loaned by Mr. W. J. Higgins, M.H.A., President of the Football League, and of the Fathers of sport on the Isle.

Notes on the Bonne Bay Deer Lake Road.

There were 2,400 men employed on this road, and about ten million paid; reported costing \$27,000,000.

This work was closed down Sept. 10th, and Mr. Scammell, who was here at the time, informed the men that the money was all spent.

Many destitute men from along the coast, came here seeking work, and only getting a few days, were worse financially when laid off, as they had to pay their way to their homes, and sides waiting here several days.

Mr. Scammell held a public meeting at the Court House, of the labourers north of this. No others were admitted, as the doors were locked and many who tried to gain admission, says those men a lot of hot air, and fish regulations, and extra tariff, etc.

The food supplies for this road, which were purchased by one of the local merchants, at enormous prices, and 5% commission for his services, costing the Government nearly \$300,000, are now being disposed of, and the proceeds will be a heavy drain on the Government's purse.

There are now four men employed on the road, and the sales are very slow; so active is the Government has a retail store here at present.
