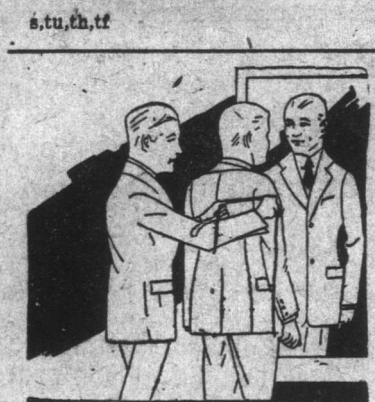

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

S.S. MAPLEDOWN RUNS AMUCK.

MONTREAL, June 2.
The coal barge Mapledown was run
down yesterday and sank immedi-
ately. Six men were thrown into the
water, but were picked up. The
Mapledown sustained some slight
damage to her bows, but was later
able to resume her voyage to St.
John's.

B.E.S. CO. REFUSE EMPLOYEES DEMANDS.

SYDNEY, June 2.
The British Empire Steel Corpora-
tion yesterday, declared itself unable
to meet the demands of employees
for a twenty per cent. wage increase
and refused on principle to adopt the
check-off system, which would amount
to a recognition of the Steel Workers'
Union. During the interview a com-
mittee informed Mr. Bischoff they had
taken a strike vote and there was
found to be large majority in favor of
a walk out.

LORD ROBERT CECIL'S PLEA FOR LEAGUE.

Lord Robert Cecil, last night, made
an eloquent plea to the United States
before the English Speaking Union to
join the League of Nations. He de-
clared he had found widespread sen-
timent throughout the United States
in favour of the League, and he sound-
ed the warning that in many parts of
the world, were symptoms developing
that were profoundly disquieting. He
surprised his audience by telling them
there were more armed men in
Europe than before the war. He af-
firmed that the tendency of most lar-
ger countries was toward greater
military equipment. "There seems to
be a conviction during the last few
months that, force, violence and
bloodshed again are coming into
favor, as an instrument for settling
international disputes," Lord Robert
said.



Inter-Club Billiards.

C. E. L. NOW LEADING BY 213
POINTS.

Last night's billiard game re-
sulted in two victories for the C.E.L.

MILDRED "ACTS" LIKE EVERY-

Mildred Davis does unquestionably
the best work of her three years with

Was Unconscious for Seven Months.

KNOCKED DOWN BY AUTO IN NO-
VEMBER, VICTIM DIED MAY
24TH.

A pathological case of wide inter-
est to the medical profession and to
the public generally was revealed in
Montreal on May 24th, when Napoleon
Bessette, 57 years of age, of 420 La-
fontaine Park, was reported to have
died in the course of the night, after
remaining seven months in a state of
absolute unconsciousness.

On November 8, 1922, Bessette was
knocked down at the corner of Mar-
tine and Delormier Streets by an
automobile driven by Stanislas La-
pierre, of 300 Goin Boulevard. He
was taken unconscious to the hospital
where he remained a month, after
which he was removed to his house,
where he died on May 24th without
having ever gained consciousness for
one moment.

Poland Begins Enforcing Compulsory Education Law.

WARSAW, May 5. (A.P.)—The
first step towards the introduction of
compulsory education in Poland, as
provided by the constitution, has
been made by the Ministry of Educa-
tion which announces that, beginning
next fall, all children born in Poland
who have reached the age of seven
years shall be obliged to go to
school.
